Bible Reading: Matthew 9:35-10:1a, 10:5-10:14

Then Jesus went about all the cities and villages, teaching in their synagogues, and proclaiming the good news of the kingdom, and curing every disease and every sickness. When he saw the crowds, he had compassion for them, because they were harassed and helpless, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, "The harvest is plentiful, but the laborers are few; therefore ask the Lord of the harvest to send out laborers into his harvest."

Then Jesus summoned his twelve disciples and gave them authority over unclean spirits...

These twelve Jesus sent out with the following instructions: "Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town of the Samaritans, but go rather to the lost sheep of the house of Israel. As you go, proclaim the good news, 'The kingdom of heaven has come near.' Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out demons. You received without payment; give without payment. Take no gold, or silver, or copper in your belts, no bag for your journey, or two tunics, or sandals, or a staff; for laborers deserve their food. Whatever town or village you enter, find out who in it is worthy, and stay there until you leave. As you enter the house, greet it. If the house is worthy, let your peace come upon it; but if it is not worthy, let your peace return to you. If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words, shake off the dust from your feet as you leave that house or town.

Response to the Bible Reading

As we reflect on sacred Story, Spirit give us inspiration. As we seek a fresh direction for our lives, grant us courage to follow your call, God. Living Word, bless our receiving of you today. Amen.

Message: Yes, you!

We celebrated two big birthdays over the past two Sundays – first the birthday of the Christian Church on Pentecost, then we celebrated 95 years since the extraordinary work of 3 denominations deciding to become one United Church of Canada. The balloons are cleared, the bits of cake scraped off the floor. Now what? How do we live day-to-day as Christians?

Of course, we can ask: Is there any wisdom to glean from Biblical Story? You know I'm going to say, of course there is. this story we just heard, a portion of Jesus' pep talk to the disciples as he sends them off, no one alone, always in pairs. It is a tough world out there.

Imagine their lives, nomads wandering from town to town. They depended on the hospitality of villagers – no home; severing detachments that would weigh them down when Spirit calls. Utter trust in God's grace to carry them. For many among us, our problem is likely the opposite; we have many entanglements, mortgages or rent to pay, jobs or relationships that we might be very focused on.

How do we actively make space amidst the pressing demands of our lives so we can experience a call or sense of mission? Even if we do hear God's call, will we answer? What is it you want me to do? You sure it's me you want?

Calls in life, we've also used the term "shoulder taps"; do you have room in your life for one? What might one look like? Imagine that you are at the church's Annual Meeting. It is decided that the church needs a new diversity team. They need a chair for that team, someone with great skills. They are describing the mandate of this new committee and you hear your name mentioned... Would you consider leading this team, they ask? You have skills and experience. They are right. It is definitely work that is important to you, you think, but thinking more about it, the church has so much work to do. At first you're flattered. But, can you do it?

Those disciples upon first hearing Jesus' vision for the work to do at first hearing I imagine them excited, but then the questions emerge. They are natural ones. Can I do this? This is going to be challenging, is it worth it?

Really listen to Jesus, and the call does not at all sound easy. The Storyteller Matthew describes needy crowds of people needing hope, healing. *Travel light and don't accept money*, Jesus says. *If people don't welcome you or care to listen, brush the dust of at the edge of town and move on.* What, potentially hostile hosts? This always reminds me of my two weeks learning to sell vacuum cleaners with my trainer... twice we encountered hostility. One of those times the free thank you gift my supervisor gave them was used as a projectile thrown at us as we fled the house.

The call to be Christian is not at all easy. This all brings to mind for me the words of Bruce Cockburn:

But nothing worth having comes without some kind of fight. Got to kick at the darkness 'til it bleeds daylight.¹

The good news is that they, and we, are told not to do this alone. We are part of community first, we accompany one another. A phrase in today's instructions of Jesus intrigues me:

Go nowhere among the Gentiles, and enter no town

of the Samaritans, but go rather

to the lost sheep of the house of Israel.

Jesus is not here advising his friends *not* to reach boldly outside their Jewish circles to those in need. "Lost sheep...of Israel" – for me those are the faithful, the people have just lost their way and need care. There is something very close to home for me, in this. So many children and grandchildren of dedicated United Church people grew up hearing the stories of faith.

But, somehow, the Story doesn't always take hold in them. So many wonderful people in our world do not get to hear, daily or weekly, that they are known and so loved by God. Not the fickle brand of love that the world offers. but God's love is unconditional type that loves you with all your blemishes. In this busy world I think that people need to be reminded that they have purpose, and that calls from God are not just for Reverend or Pastor so-and-so. Like Torrin, exploring his call to

an adventure ahead that is still taking shape for him. For you, and I, and all of us, working out a sense of call can take a lifetime.

Where are the good people weighed down by burdens in life; entangled in the complexity, needing to simplify? How do we encourage one another in this holy loving work?

Those *crowds* comprised of the *harassed and helpless*. We know that that our work as Christians begins with our collective work to meet fundamental needs: providing food and shelter to those who have little. But then, as Maslow suggests, when those are met, we help each other, the needy people around us, to address the spiritual needs; helping one another to contribute meaningfully. Feeling like we belong within a community. We are called not to go alone, but go as community, to go with God to model Holy and Unconditional Love to a world full of good people in our families, among our friends, and even to strangers who just need to be reminded that God loves them, blemishes and all.

Blessing of Torrin Maag

Donna:

Earlier in the spring, we celebrated with Torrin Maag, when he learned that he had been accepted into the Explorer Program for The United Church of Canada.

The Explorer Program is an immersion-type learning experience, where people who are considering a possible call to the ministry are invited to try out an opportunity of working in a team ministry over the summer.

Torrin was paired with the congregation of Forest Hill United Church. Due to the pandemic, and because of restrictions put on travel and worship, the program was cancelled. But the people of Forest Hill thought they could continue, in a different but creative way. They invited Torrin into a conversation and together, they came up with a plan.

Torrin:

Using Zoom, like we do here at St. Andrew's, I am able to offer some leadership in Sunday worship and other church activities. I am participating in and helping run an online Bible Study, Spirit Circles, and pastoral care. I'm also helping with their YouTube services: reading scripture, writing prayers, and presenting three sermons over the summer. My first-ever sermon will be next Sunday, on the 21st.

While I'm disappointed that I won't be learning under them through the Explorer Program, I'm glad to have the opportunity to work with them regardless, receiving their support and feedback.

Donna:

On May 17th, Torrin's relationship with Forest Hill was formalized in a covenant. While we are not able to make a formal education covenant with Torrin, we are able to offer you our blessing, and hold you in prayer.

We celebrate the good news that there are differing gifts, many ways to serve, and we believe that God is working in your life, Torrin, to guide you into a future we can only imagine and celebrate.

Torrin, your home group members, Betty McFarlane, Revs. Dave and Catherine and me, Donna, will be there however you need us.

Your whole church family at St. Andrew's holds you in prayer.
