Prelude

Welcome (Greeter – Phil Thurston)

Welcome to worship here at St. Andrew's United Church. Wherever you join us from, I invite you to take this moment to look at your space around you. You are on holy ground, as we are here.

As you can see, we are still recording worship online, not yet gathering physically in a sanctuary, together, but distanced. The St. Andrew's leadership team, your Council, chose to wait an extra week; we chose to be cautious, in order to monitor the COVID situation before inviting the community of faith together physically. We are hoping that we might gather to worship on September 27 with a full list of precautions in place. Council will make the final decision about this on September 21. Please check the NEWS, our Facebook page, and website for further updates about when we will be in the sanctuary again.

Now, let us worship God.

Acknowledging Traditional Territory

This is holy ground, very sacred to us. Sacred especially to the First Peoples on whose land we worship this morning. We, here at St. Andrew's United Church, worship on the traditional territories both of the Wahnapitae First Nation and the Atikameksheng Anishnawbek, land where the Robinson Huron Treaty was made in 1850, a Treaty that was never honoured by the colonizers of this land. Whose traditional territory are you worshipping on today?

We recognize the long history of our First Nations and Métis peoples; we give thanks for their stewardship of the land throughout the ages. Let us, all of us, Treaty people, commit ourselves anew to the work of healing, justice and reconciliation.

Lighting the Christ Candle

We take a breath. We pause before we enter worship. Take a moment to breathe in. God's spirit is everywhere, like the very breath that invigorates your vital organs. Together we light the Christ candle, but what does it mean? Does it, does our worship today, change anything? A candle seems small and insignificant in the larger scheme of things, but we come like flickering candles, Loving God. We come, feeling small and insignificant sometimes. Ordinary, yet, God in your baffling wisdom in Bible story after story, you choose the most ordinary people to accomplish the most extraordinary things.

You give abundance, Holy One, when we are open to it, and you invite us to share that abundance, and to become whole. We light this Christ Candle to recognize God's abundant love that blesses us, and blesses extravagantly through us. [Light Candle]

Call to Worship

Bible Readings (Sharon Long)

Psalm 105, Part Four (verses 37-45, adapted from Voices United)

You led Israel out, with spoil of silver and gold. Among the tribes not one fell behind. The Egyptians were glad when they went, For dread of Israel had fallen upon them.

You spread cloud as a screen, and fire as light by night. The people asked, and you sent them quail, you fill them with bread from heaven. You opened a rock and water gushed out: It flowed like a river through the arid land.

Matthew 20: 1-16

Through this challenging parable of Jesus, we see a glimpse of God's wisdom, God's love, that baffles our sense of justice.

"For the kingdom of heaven is like a landowner who went out early in the morning to hire labourers for his vineyard. After agreeing with the labourers for the usual daily wage, he sent them into his vineyard. When he went out about nine o'clock, he saw others standing idle in the marketplace; and he said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard, and I will pay you whatever is right.' So they went. When he went out again about noon and about three o'clock, he did the same. And about five o'clock he went out and found others standing around; and he said to them, 'Why are you standing here idle all day?' They said to him, 'Because no one has hired us.' He said to them, 'You also go into the vineyard.' When evening came, the owner of the vineyard said to his manager, 'Call the labourers and give them their pay, beginning with the last and then going to the first.' When those hired about five o'clock came, each of them received the usual daily wage. Now when the first came, they thought they would receive more; but each of them also received the usual daily wage. And when they received it, they grumbled against the landowner, saying, 'These last worked only one hour, and you have made them equal to us who have borne the burden of the day and the scorching heat.' But he replied to one of them, 'Friend, I am doing you no wrong; did you not agree with me for the usual daily wage? Take what belongs to you and go; I choose to give to this last the same as I give to you. Am I not allowed to do what I choose with what belongs to me? Or are you envious because I am generous?'

So the last will be first, and the first will be last."

Let us pray: God of long ago and present day. We come seeking a word for the day; a light for our way and bread for the journey. Fill us with your word so that we can become the people you created us to be. Amen.
