Prelude

Welcome

Welcome to worship. In this moment, we turn to God. We settle into stillness. We set aside the burdens of our daily lives. We ask for spaciousness, that we might listen deeply and touch the place of God's holiness that exists in each one of us.

Here we are -again- in the sanctuary at St. Andrew's United Church on Larch Street in Sudbury. Our church council made the decision to continue to meet virtually one more week, and then if the news about our community's well-being is good, next week, a small group of twenty people will join us for worship in the sanctuary. That service will be taped and posted to you tube, for those who are not feeling quite ready to return to in-person worship. We will keep you informed. Please continue to check emails, our Facebook page, the church website or call the church office for more information.

Now, we begin – turning, settling, setting aside, asking, seeking the presence of God. Now, let us worship God.

Acknowledging Traditional Territory

This is holy ground, very sacred to us. Sacred especially to the First Peoples on whose land we worship this morning. We, here at St. Andrew's United Church, worship on the traditional territories both of the Wahnapitae First Nation and the Atikameksheng Anishnawbek, land where the Robinson Huron Treaty was made in 1850, a Treaty that was never honoured by the colonizers of this land. Whose traditional territory are you worshipping on today?

We recognize the long history of our First Nations and Métis peoples, we give thanks for their stewardship of the land throughout the ages. Let us, all of us, Treaty people, commit ourselves anew to the work of healing, justice and reconciliation.

Lighting the Christ Candle

We take a deep cleansing breath as we prepare to worship. We light this Christ Candle Symbolizing our desire for wisdom for our journey, and the fire of hope we seek from our Creator.

Come, O Holy Spirit: come as Holy Fire and burn in us, come as Holy Wind and cleanse us within, come as Holy Truth and dispel our ignorance, come as Holy Power and enable our weakness, come as Holy Life and dwell in us. Convict us, convert us, consecrate us, until we are set free from the service of ourselves, to be your servants to the world. Amen. [Light Candle]

5. Let us build a house where all are named, their songs and visions heard and loved and treasured, taught and claimed as words within the Word. Built of tears and cries and laughter, prayers of faith and songs of grace; let this house proclaim from floor to rafter:

All are welcome, all are welcome, all are welcome in this place.

Bible Readings

Psalm 78:1-7 (VU p. 792, Part One)

Refrain: We will tell new generations of the wonders God has done.

Give heed to my teaching, O my people, turn your ears to the words of my mouth.

I will open my mouth in a parable;

I will reveal the hidden meaning of things in the past.

What we have heard and known,

what our parents have told us,

we will not hide from their grandchildren,

but declare to the next generation

the testimony that you gave to Jacob

and the law you appointed in Israel,

which you commanded them to teach their children,

that the next generation might know them, children yet unborn, and these in turn should arise, and tell their children,

Matthew 21:28-32

This is a reading from the Gospel of Matthew. It might be helpful for you to know that just before Jesus tells this story, the religious elite have been questioning what authority Jesus claims to have as he performs miracles and teaches.

"What do you think? A man had two sons; he went to the first and said, 'Son, go and work in the vineyard today.' He answered, 'I will not'; but later he changed his mind and went. The father went to the second and said the same; and he answered, 'I go, sir'; but he did not go. Which of the two did the will of his father?" They said, "The first." Jesus said to them, "Truly I tell you, the tax collectors and the prostitutes are going into the kingdom of God ahead of you. For John came to you in the way of righteousness and you did not believe him, but the tax collectors and the prostitutes believed him; and even after you saw it, you did not change your minds and believe him."

Disrupt our comfortable attitudes and assumptions with your Living Word, Holy God. May your kind-dom vision usher into our world a spirit of reconciliation and radical love, and it begin with us. Amen.

Minute for Right Relations

Phyllis was delighted with the bright orange shirt that her grandmother gave her to wear on her first day at St. Joseph's Mission residential school in British Columbia. But when Phyllis arrived at the school, her clothes were taken away and she was given a uniform. Phyllis never saw that orange shirt again. She was very hurt and left with a feeling of worthlessness.

A reunion of the school was help in 2013, with events designed to commemorate the residential school experience, to witness and honour the healing journey of the survivors and their families, and to commit to the on-going process of reconciliation.

Phyllis (Jack) Webstad told the story of her orange shirt at that reunion. Since then, every year Orange Shirt Day is held on September 30, the time of year that children were taken from their homes to residential schools. It is an opportunity for children and adults to learn about the effects of Residential Schools and the legacy they left behind.

God our Creator, we are facing many challenges at this time. We each need a reminder of your gentle and healing way. Teach us how to live respectfully, fully, generously with all people, and with all of creation. We pray for strength.

God our Creator, in silence we offer our prayers... especially we pray for Tracey and Mitch who will be married later today. Thank you for this blessed day. For the friends of Dorothy Johnson, who mourn her passing as they gathered to celebrate her life this week. Thank you for grace and healing.

May all glory, praise and thanksgiving be shown to you, God of all mercies and compassion, Jesus, guardian and keeper of our souls, and Spirit, our peace and our communion. Amen.
