Welcome

Welcome to worship here at St. Andrew's United Church. Wherever you join us from, I invite you to take this moment prayerfully look around your space if you are in your home. Those of us in this sanctuary, look around, invite God's Spirit in. You and I are on holy ground. We gather in worship, to be God's community here, but more importantly, living out Christ's love and forgiveness for a world that needs it. We are so thankful that you can join us for worship today. Acknowledging Traditional Territory

This is holy ground, very sacred to us. Sacred especially to the First Peoples on whose land we worship this morning. We, here at St. Andrew's United Church, worship on the traditional territories both of the Wahnapitae First Nation and the Atikameksheng Anishnawbek, land where the Robinson Huron Treaty was made in 1850, a Treaty that was never honoured by the colonizers of this land. Whose traditional territory are you worshipping on today?

We recognize the long history of our First Nations and Métis peoples, we give thanks for their stewardship of the land throughout the ages. Let us, all of us, Treaty people, commit ourselves anew to the work of healing, justice and reconciliation.

Bible Readings (Freda Wilson)

Exodus 20:1-4, 7-9, 12-20

Today our focus reading comes from the Book of Exodus, in the Hebrew Scripture. This is a paraphrase of the story of how intermediary Moses delivers Yahweh's ten commandments to the Israelites.

A Loving Community

The people of Israel lived together as a community. They did not live in only one place, but they moved to different locations and set up camps wherever they went. When they moved, they brought everything they had with them. The leader of the people was named Moses. Moses was called to speak for God, and to lead the people of Israel away from their troubles and to a new life. Sometimes, God would speak directly to Moses and then ask Moses to tell the people what God had said.

One day, the people of Israel arrived at the base of a mountain; it was called Mount Sinai. The people were only allowed to be at the bottom of the mountain, but God wanted Moses to go up to the top of the mountain so that God could speak to Moses from there. Moses went up the mountain to talk with God.

When God spoke with Moses, God gave the people of Israel ways of living together in community. They were rules of love so that they could care for one another and God.

God gave these words to Moses and Moses gave them to the people:

Love only me as your God.

- Do not create carvings and statues of false gods; these are idols.
- My name is important, so please only use God's name for good and for praise.
- On one day of the week, you should rest and keep the day holy. That day will be the Sabbath. You can

work the other six days of the week. Love your parents. Be respectful of all living things. Be faithful and loyal in your marriages. Respect what belongs to others. Be honest at all times, especially about others in your community.

You have been given many things. It is not good to look at what your neighbours have and want those things also.

When God finished speaking, all of Mount Sinai was covered with smoke. There were thunder and lightning. There was even the sound of a trumpet! The people saw all of this and became scared and tried to move away from the mountain.

Then, the people of Israel spoke to their leader Moses. The people said, "Moses, when you speak with us, we will listen to you. But please do not let God speak with us – we think that we will die!" Moses told the people not to be so scared. "God spoke to us with love," Moses said. "God gave us rules so that we could be a loving community together!""

Psalm 19: 7-9, 14 (New International Version)

A reading, a portion taken from Psalm 19, a song of faith about God's laws that lay out parameters for the Israelites for healthy community. May this be our proclamation today in these chaotic times.

The law of the Lord is perfect,

refreshing the soul. The statutes of the Lord are trustworthy, making wise the simple. The precepts of the Lord are right, giving joy to the heart. The commands of the Lord are radiant, giving light to the eyes. The fear of the Lord is pure,

Today I have the privilege of introducing you to our new Loving Your Neighbour banner. You may have noticed it last week or perhaps when you came in to worship this morning. Not only is it something new, but there are a whole lot of ideas hanging around this brilliant banner.

Last year the Reaching Out team found this banner on Facebook and it caught our imagination. Dave picked up on it and we were able to order the digital rights to this amazing vehicle of communication. Since then we have been talking about how we share its message. We don't see this banner as something to just hang around and look pretty. We see it as somewhat of a challenge, and we hope that in our life together as a community, this banner will have a lot to say to us, in all aspects of our lives together.

So, we are launching a project, or a program, maybe an initiative – whatever you might call it, and we are calling it Love Your Neighbour – or LYN for short.

Even though we got started on Love Your Neighbour at least a year ago we can't believe how timely it has become. Maybe you have felt like many of us this summer – overwhelmed with the violence and challenging messages that we hear every day. Well, we don't have any answers to those daunting questions, but we think we can take a small step within ourselves to reach out, to think about what it means to be inclusive, or welcoming, or accepting. So even in these days of social distancing and modified worship, we are planning some ideas to help us start to think about what the words of this banner can mean to us.

On the back pillars we have an exciting start to our project. It is an unfolding story of what love looks like. You are invited to bring in or send pictures or short stories that show love in some way. We aren't taking them down for a long time so please, when you see or hear of something that looks like love to you, bring in the picture and put it on the pillars. We are going to cover those pillars with visions of loving your neighbour.

In the next few weeks we will be sending videos in the NEWS that will connect with Love Your Neighbour. Please watch the videos and we would love your feedback. Over the next year we will be discussing various aspects of LYN in a variety of mediums as we strive to meet the challenges of loving your neighbour – to quote Michelle Obama, being open and accepting of differences.
