MESSAGE: "Follow the Leader"

I'm re-retired, and over the years of ministry training I've taken more than a few courses on leadership. I've never really thought of myself as a leader. That's a role for other people. People on the world stage – presidents and prime ministers, heads of corporations and organizations. It's the role of trail-blazers and game changers, people like civil rights leader Martin Luther King Jr. or anti-colonial nationalist Mahatma Gandhi, or environmental activist Autumn Peltier, the young woman from Wikwemikong who is the chief water protector for the Anishnabek Nation.

We're introduced to the concept of leadership early in life. Come back with me a few years and remember this game. The person at the head of the line goes through various actions, skipping, turning circles, summersaults, crab walks, hopping on one foot, thinking up various moves; and each person in the line behind must imitate those actions or lose their place in the game. A leader is someone who gets to go first and has ideas we are expected/invited to follow. As a person somewhere in the line, maybe you couldn't wait until it was your turn. Then you could demonstrate your own creativity as the leader.

Various disciplines have come up with the concept of leadership styles, (much as you might have a personality type.) One model I referred to suggested eight styles. Another, a health care model proposed four: transactional, transformational, servant, and charismatic. It's not that you would use only one style, but that you might operate mainly from that perspective, depending on your preferred way, or as required by the context. In the stories of our ancestors in the faith the people are the followers. And their leaders are legendary: like Moses; the patriarchs Abraham, Isaac and Jacob; and prophets Elijah and Elisha. These leaders, with their close connection to the Lord, shaped a people's identity. To their surrounding neighbours these people and leaders were unique, a people who claimed "The Lord" as their true leader. Their God.

But the people wanted a king like other nations had, and God reluctantly agreed to a monarchy. It was a continuing saga of battles and infidelities, of human failures, and of people not following in the ways of God. Monarchy seemed to serve the people no better than any other style of leadership. And yet, Solomon's prayer, coming out of his encounter with the Lord in a dream, impressed me with his desire for wisdom. "I'm just young and have no experience," he says. I sympathized. He had big shoes to fill, and already he had been taking steps to secure the kingdom, eliminating his father's adversaries and settling scores. Who wouldn't feel secure with a leader who demonstrates military strength and governs with a strong will. Solomon wants to follow in his father's footsteps and lead by David's example; and he goes forward as the chosen son (he was not the first in line) with David's instruction and blessing. The covenant bond with God's people continues to define a nation whose legendary leaders are held in high esteem. We all want and need leaders to guide us well.

Throughout these seemingly endless months of the Covid 19 pandemic good leadership has been paramount. We have taken note of how other countries have managed; and asked what we could learn from each other. What will we begin to do differently knowing the vast inequities in people's experience of these difficult times? We've also witnessed a less-than-peaceful transition of power in the United States; and heard the voices of so many telling us that it is time to put past wrongs to right: Black lives matter demonstrations, the Truth and Reconciliation Report's calls to action, the anti-hate protestors naming our collective sins. We need good, strong and faithful leaders in every place.

I believe that leadership on the small stage is the focus of Jesus' ministry, his mission the empowerment of people in their family and community lives. It means that I am a leader, and you are a leader. What we do on a small scale changes/transforms the world.

Perhaps you have a memory of that one teacher or leader who made a significant difference in your life, and set you on the path of becoming who you are today. I recall a conversation with a woman from a congregation I once served. It was around Father's Day and she was remembering how much her father loved teaching. His

favourite part was when his students didn't understand. "That's when it would get interesting," he would say. And her father would be eager to try some new approach.

Jesus, our teacher, is known for his use of parables throughout the gospels, and the Gospel of John frames some lessons in metaphors, the "I am" sayings. I sympathize with the disciples, who couldn't seem to grasp it when Jesus was teaching about himself and his mission. Jesus talks about himself as food for his disciples. This message has strong Eucharistic overtones, and I know John's gospel has layers of meaning to sift through for those who have ears to hear; but if taken literally, this image has a bit of an ick factor, at least to me. What if we imagine Jesus feeding us in the same way our mothers did, at first in the womb, and then nurtured at the breast after birth — would it be too much of a stretch to think Jesus might have taught that way in order that we might understand? Jesus has come bind up the wounds, to comfort the broken-hearted, to create a community of caring, passionate, justice-seeking, peacemakers — where his followers wash one another's feet, and love one another as he has loved us. His followers will carry the light for each other. As one author put it, "We are basically here to walk each other home."

We are the incarnation of what was spoken by the prophet Joel, and recognized by Peter in his sermon. The young and old, the servant and free, the sons and daughters - people of all gender identities, the Jew and Gentile, the indigenous and racialized. We are not simply imitating Christ, copying his moves, as we would if playing 'follow the leader'. The church, the community of Christ's followers, has been birthed through the coming of Jesus Spirit to dwell among us and within us. We are far from perfect, but I believe we are ready. We are more attuned to a diversity of voices than we once were. We are more aware of our faults and failures, our places of privilege. Perhaps we can pray, as did Solomon, for wisdom, because we are young, inexperienced, and don't know how to go out and come in.

As some of you will know, last summer I took up kayaking. I never go out alone, but have a partner or a group to journey with. We take turns leading and exploring and suggesting where to paddle. Sometimes the others have to help me out of the kayak at the end of a long outing. Really that's the hardest part, and I decided not to get

embarrassed about my limits. I was out with two sisters and a brother in law at Lake Laurentian Conservation Area recently, where the opportunities to explore nature are bountiful. We were observing some Canada geese with a long line of goslings behind them; too many to have been hatched by the same parents, I wondered? We know geese gather for migration, and travel in v formation to maximize energy savings, and take turns at the lead. They form family groupings to protect and care for their young. The hatchings are watched over in a sort of goosy day care, a shared, co-operative leadership, not unlike those we rely on in church and community groups.

We're in uncharted territory – we're moving from leadership based on power and authority residing in one individual set apart, to leadership that comes from having a dive rsity of voices at the table. It is not easy to give way in order to create space where people are safe. But we will take turns being the leader, and then the follower. It will be like the childhood game – everyone will have a voice, and we will depend on one another as we find a new way, a better way – after Jesus who is the way, the truth and the life. Amen.
