Scripture Readings (Deb McIntosh)

Mark 8: 27-34

Jesus asks, "Who do you say that I am?"

This is another story from the Gospel writer Mark, reminding us that being a leader walking in the footsteps of Jesus can be a very humbling experience.

Jesus and his disciples went to the villages near the town of Caesarea Philippi. As they were walking along, he asked them, "What do people say about me?"

The disciples answered, "Some say you are John the Baptist or maybe Elijah. Others say you are one of the prophets."

Then Jesus asked them, "But who do you say I am?"

"You are the Messiah!" Peter replied...

Jesus began telling his disciples what would happen to him. He said, "The nation's leaders, the chief priests, and the teachers of the Law of Moses will make the Son of Man suffer terribly. He will be rejected and killed, but three days later he will rise to life." ...

Peter took Jesus aside and told him to stop talking like that. But when Jesus turned and saw the disciples, he corrected Peter. He said to him, "Satan, get away from me! You are thinking like everyone else and not like God."

Jesus then told the crowd and the disciples to come closer, and he said:

If any of you want to be my followers, you must forget about yourself. You must take up your cross and follow me. If you want to save your life, you will destroy it. But if you give up your life for me and for the good news, you will save it.

James 3:1-10

In the second reading today, James offers yet more of the more than 100 rather blunt, but often useful, gems of wisdom. Last week we heart "faith without works is dead", this week the focus is on the way we speak – do we start fires or reflect God's love?

My friends, we should not all try to become teachers. In fact, teachers will be judged more strictly than others. All of us do many wrong things. But if you can control your tongue, you are mature and able to control your whole body.

By putting a bit into the mouth of a horse, we can turn the horse in different directions. It takes strong winds to move a large sailing ship, but the captain uses only a small rudder to make it go in any direction. Our tongues are small too, and yet they brag about big things.

It takes only a spark to start a forest fire! The tongue is like a spark...

My dear friends, with our tongues we speak both praises and curses. We praise our God, and we curse people who were created to be like God, and this isn't right.

Let us pray: Teach us your names, O God, spoken in acts of mercy and justice and grace. May we learn your names, Christ, and speak with your spirit and love. Spirit, may we recognize your names, especially as you transform lives and build faith, resilient, communities. Amen.

On the night before he died it was Jesus who took a loaf of bread, gave you thanks, broke it, and said, "Take and eat; whenever you do this, remember me." Likewise, after supper, he took the cup, saying, "This is the new covenant; remember me."

Prayers of the Community

God, when the disciple Peter answered Jesus' question by calling him the Christ, the Messiah, he echoed the hope for salvation, healing, shalom.

We pray for our families, ourselves, those broken places in our hearts needing your mending Spirit, God.

Who do we say you are? Who do we confess Jesus to be?

Prophet, Healer, Teacher - all three.

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kin-dom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kin-dom, the power and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

Divine Love, pour out your Spirit of life and hope upon us; Your diverse children – wayward and wise, foolish and faithful, who gather around your Table. Bless the gifts of the bread and cup. As the healing touch of the bread of life rests upon our tongues and hearts, may we use them as a blessing – speaking grace, caring for those who are ignored.

May the taste of the cup of salvation tingle deep within our souls, may we go to take up our crosses, following Jesus in service.
