Nurturing Safe Space

We seek Holy Spirit and Love to help us nurture safe space in this place where all can participate in worship and life regardless of age, ability, race, cultural background, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

Acknowledging Traditional Territory

My ancestors were settlers, I am a settler, but I, and you, we are all Treaty people. This is a settler church – formed in the beginning in ways that did not honour the hospitality of the First Peoples of this land. Our Moderator said in the United Church apology in 1986: We confused Western ways and culture with the depth and breadth and length and height of the gospel of Christ. We imposed our civilization as a condition of accepting the gospel. We tried to make you be like us and in so doing we helped to destroy the vision that made you what you were.

We all, whether you are joining online or those gathered physically in the sanctuary, we all gather a traditional territory of Indigenous peoples. We are grateful to be allowed to use these lands for growing spiritually and worshipping. We acknowledge and pay respect to the Indigenous, the Metis, ancestors of this particular land, particularly those of the Wahnapiatae First Nation and the Atikemeksheng Anishnawbek. Let us work earnestly for Reconciliation.

Time up Front – Intentional Giving

Props: 1 cracker, 1 burger bun, and 1 loaf of bread (or any other objects; what matters is quantity)

Looking at these three gifts given for people who are hungry, which one of them will feed the most people?

So how much you give matters. The more you give, the more is available to be given to others. The more you give is the more we have to do what needs to be done.

Hear what the Bible says in 2 Corinthians 9:6. "The point is this: the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully" (2 Corinthians 9:6).

Wait! Does that mean that the other gifts don't matter?

Not at all. Every gift matters. What is important is that everyone gives. When everyone gives, there will be more available to give to others.

*Should someone feel sad because they are only able to give one cracker or the burger bun?
Should someone feel embarrassed because they cannot afford to give a whole loaf of bread?*

Hear what it says in the Bible, 2 Corinthians 9:7. "Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Corinthians 9:7).

What that means is that each of us must make up our minds about what we can afford to give. When we decide, then we should give it happily.

We should be thankful that we have something to give, no matter how small we think it is. When we can't give things like money and supplies, then we do what we can to help: we give our time and our talent cheerfully. No matter what we give, when we give cheerfully, God loves it!

This is a repeat after me prayer: God, we thank you for giving to us so that we have something to give. Bless what we give—money, food, time or talent. Help us to give as much as we can. no matter how small it may seem, help us to give it cheerfully. Amen.

Scripture Reading (*Eric Maag*)

2 Corinthians 9:6–7 (NRSV)

This is a letter from Paul to siblings in Christ who live in Corinth. Paul is encouraging the Corinthians to give generously to a collection he is taking for the Christians in Jerusalem. Our time this week is designed to explore what it means to give as a discipline.

The point is this: the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.

Let us pray: This is the time for reflection. This is the time for inspiration. This is the time for determination. This is the time to set out in the direction revealed by God. Living Word in our midst, may you bless our receiving of your Story. Amen.

Message: “Giving with Purpose”

This message is from the Stewardship Resource [see end credits] and was edited by Rev. Dave.

We reflected at the last Stewardship worship on *gratitude as a practice*, the foundation of following Jesus. In short, we highlighted the fact that the spiritual practice of gratitude can make a difference in us and influence how we live differently and reach out to the world. This week, we focus on the potential of giving to stir greater generosity when it springs from loving intention. We will take a deeper look at this letter from Paul in ancient times, a leader of the new movement after Jesus was crucified.

Paul writes this portion of his letter to the Corinthian church to address one specific area of their Christian witness: their financial giving to support those in need in Jerusalem, including needy Christians. This letter was also written to stir the people to give in the midst of a famine that had swept across Judea.

Within these two verses, there are two key principles for us to consider as we think about giving: 1) it matters how much we give and 2) giving should be intentional with love in mind. Using the principle of sowing and reaping, Paul highlights that generosity begets greater generosity.

Here’s what he says: “...the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully” (2 Corinthians 9:6).

This is a principle that holds true in the natural and spiritual world. It is a principle that would be obvious to a farmer or a gardener. There is a direct relationship between the abundance and sparsity of a harvest based on the quantity sown. Now, I’m not a farmer. But it is intuitive that if we scatter seed sparingly in a field, it will produce a meager crop. Scatter generously, and it will produce an abundant crop.

That word “sparingly” is a good translation from the Greek; it means to *hold back*, to give with restraint, *to measure with a teaspoon rather than a jug*. We can imagine Paul suspecting there are givers who are holding back from giving, even though they have enough available to give more. **If that is the case, then the restraint is not just about the money; it is about the state of the heart of the giver.**

The seed you and I sow may be our money, or the offering of our time, or contributing our talent. What holds you, or me, back from giving generously, with our whole heart? What holds us back from giving more, when in reality we can give? Remember that giving is as much our time, our talents as it is giving from our money.

Too often we give out of a sense of scarcity rather than a sense of bounty. Can you relate to giving, but with a worry that you won’t have enough? I think we all been there – feeling you don’t have enough. Losing touch with a sense of trust in God – God who first provides and who promises to give us what we need. Trust is sometimes difficult to come by.

But Jesus says,

...do not worry about your life, what you will eat or what you will drink, or about your body, what you will wear ... Look at the birds of the air; they neither sow nor reap nor gather into barns, and yet your Creator feeds them...And why do you worry about clothing? Consider the lilies of the field, how they grow; they neither toil nor spin, yet I tell you, even Solomon in all his glory was not clothed like one of these. ...But strive first for the kin-dom of God and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well” (Matthew 6:25–26, 28–29, 33).

Here’s the thing: if we want to make a difference, to be part of God’s vision of making a difference, then giving with half a heart won’t work. As we stumble across these scripture stories and parables, we are continually reminded that we need to sow our seeds differently. We are invited to change to the way we give, to give out of a sense of bounty rather than out of scarcity.

Paul uses this principle of “bountiful giving”, using the Greek word *eulogia*, literally means “good” “word”, but later evolves into meaning “blessing”. In essence it means that those who bless will be blessed, those who give generously will receive generosity in return. Where might the blessing come from? Let me propose two possible directions:

First, the act of giving itself—can you remember a time that you gave extravagantly to someone or something that was meaningful to you? We feel a burst of satisfaction, joy. Did I actually do that? I went all out, there, rather than following my rule of giving a little to this and to that. Jesus does say, “It is more blessed to give than to receive” (Acts 20:35).

The other blessing, I suggest, comes from our Source of blessing, our Creator God. God promises blessing, and God, throughout the stories of our Bible, delivers time and again. The invitation for our modern reality, then is to believe in our hearts that our contribution will produce a greater outcome.

Paul moves from quantity of giving to the state of the heart of the giver. He says “Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion” (2 Corinthians 9:7). The Greek he uses translates to “out of grief or sorrow” and “out of necessity or compulsion”. Giving should not be a painful experience, or feeling like someone is twisting your arm, or holding your loved one for a ransom unless you give. Our heart should neither feel coerced nor guilty as we give.

Charitable giving these days seems often driven by guilt tripping, arm-twisting, and sob stories. It’s hard to say no to images of poverty on the screen, children in need of surgery that will save their lives, parents who need assistance so that they can give their children Christmas presents. These are tactics designed to tug on our emotions. For Paul, giving is not merely out of emotion. Compassion is the emotional response to suffering, but if after giving we feel guilt or regret, I might ask: what drove my response to begin with. Paul’s directive in his letter is: give as you have “made up your mind,” – the Greek word meaning to reach a decision beforehand, to commit myself to it.

Circumstances change, and we are asked to respond – but we must evaluate what we have to give, and also the significance and size of the needs we hope to meet. That is the rational part of our giving. We have that usual offering we give, Paul suggests we prayerfully think about whether or not that is whole-hearted giving, or, if our heart is telling us to give more fully. The heart part of giving is the resolve that we give with trust in our Creator that it will make a difference, then investing our hopes, our faith with our talents and treasure. Christian giving is be a product of thoughtful discipleship. Remember when Scott McClure rode his bike in the Mission and Service

Hullabaloo to raise hundreds of dollars for “Bikes for Pastors”? Remember all the fun-raising we have done for community outreach?

Paul says: God wants invested disciples who are ready to give with heart and soul, to give because they are able to give, as they are able to give, and modern disciples who are committed to give so that God’s work will flourish. What do you think? Are you in? Amen.

Benjamin: I have to sit down a lot. I’m glad I have my device to keep me busy when you get talking. Did you know that... [Benjamin offers a “fun fact”] ... I love learning about things on YouTube, using my device.

Dad: Well, if you were to dream about what church could be like, what would make it better? Seriously?

Benjamin: It would be shorter, maybe more stuff for kids where we can move around, have some fun.

Dad: What would Jesus tell St. Andrew's United Church if he came one Sunday to worship?

Sophia: Talk to your neighbours, not judge them. Not just your neighbour in the seat next to you, but strangers. People in tents, get to know them.

Mom: Have you met them? some might be a little scary!

Sophia: No, I'll be honest, I haven't. But I feel like we could do better and start with not judging them. Loving them for who they are, getting to know them.

Dad: How could we get to know them?

Sophia: Maybe we could put together a gathering, not just one time, but building trust with the. Have food and sit down and talk to people. Build trust with them. Remember when we had the picnic and strangers came to get food, I liked that.

However, for 2022 your Resource team is asking you to consider allocating more to Local so that we can better manage our financial position as we are still currently operating in a deficit.

In February we conducted a survey and the results showed that we collectively prioritize Worship and Music, and Mission and Outreach including the wider church and our local community. And your council has worked hard to ensure that these are the true priorities. Due to the pandemic we had to rewrite how we do church. New equipment was purchased so that we could offer on-line services. A service was never missed due to the dedicated and tireless effort of so many people. And even though we do not have a music director at this time, we have recruited talented musicians who play the piano, organ and sing. Thank you to these incredible people. Talk about offering of talent! And one day we can lift our voices to the ceiling once again.

And what can I say about how we outreached to so many. Muffins, vitamin C, pizzas, Warm Hearts, Warm Sweaters, Blessing Bundles, Hot Cross Blessing bundles, sandwiches, care packages, socks, Christmas bundles, Connex, and prayers to mention a few. Our council wants to ensure you that we will still give the necessary energy and resources to these items and that we will never put Mission and Outreach on the backburner. The same for Worship and Music. It is the essence of why we are here and what we do.

I thank you for taking the time to discern how you can help our church move forward. We know that we are in transition, and we have begun to work on developing guidelines for our new fund related to Community Outreach.
