As we prepare to worship, let us take a quiet moment ... [silence]

Inviting Holy Light

Hope admits that we 're not quite there yet. Hope means that something good is within reach. God is our hope. Let us taste, see, hear, feel, smell, anticipate this hope as we light the Christ candle. [light Christ Candle]

Nurturing Safe Space

We seek Holy Spirit and Love to help us nurture safe space in this place where all can participate in worship and life regardless of age, ability, race, cultural background, sexual orientation, or gender identity.

Acknowledging Traditional Territory

For millennia, this land we live on has been cared for by First Peoples. When Europeans came to this land, and church communities formed, we did not appreciate the wisdom and spirituality that

had been here; we imposed our civilization as a condition of accepting the gospel. We are grateful to be allowed to use these lands for growing spiritually and worshipping. We acknowledge and pay respect to the Indigenous, the Métis, ancestors of this particular land, particularly those of the Wahnapitae First Nation and the Atikemeksheng Anishnawbek. Let us work earnestly for Reconciliation.

Speaker 1: For the signs in the sun and the moon and the stars, we light this candle. Speaker 2: For the unknown and the not yet,

ALL: we light this candle.

Speaker 1: For seeds planted in hope and prayers prayed in earnest, we light this candle. Speaker 2: For doubt and confusion,

ALL: we, too, light this candle.

Speaker 1: For these days of wandering and wondering, e light this candle.

Speaker 2: For all that we didn't know we were waiting for,

ALL: we light this candle of Hope. Let us worship.

Praying for Grace

Let us pray: Creator, we are so grateful for all that you have entrusted to us. But we know that on our watch, the cries of joy of your creatures are muted. We yearn for justice, but it seems that we as a human race fall short. We seek Grace, Holy One.

We will hear today, Jeremiah speaking about waiting in hope. Are there areas in my life where I feel hopeless? Can I open my heart in those moments to allow myself to believe in new beginnings?

[Silence... play singing bowl]

During this pandemic, where have we experienced hopelessness? This Advent season, how might I bring God's promise of hope to my family, church and community? [Silence... play singing bowl]

Words of Assurance

Despite all we do, or do not do, God loves us. As surely as the bud unfolds and calls forth the spring and the harvest, so God transforms our lives anew. Rejoice, friends, for God is near!

The Prayer Jesus Taught

This we pray along with the prayer taught to us by beloved who loved, and called us to love too,

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kin-dom come, Thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread, and forgive us our trespasses, as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kin-dom, the power and the glory, forever and ever. Amen.

Time Up Front

Ok, here is a pop quiz to see if you know your leaves and trees.

What kind of a tree does this leaf come from? (Maple leaves graphic)
Maple? Right. (Maple tree graphic)
That was an easy one. What tree does this leaf grow on? (Oak leaves graphic)
What tree does these leaves belong to? (Oak tree graphic)
Oak is correct. You are pretty good, but can you guess what kind of a tree this sprig comes from? (Olive leaves graphic)

Olive. Correct. (Olive tree graphic)

I saw a lot of olive trees in Palestine and Israel when I was there, it is a powerful symbol for the people of that land of peace and justice. A deep seeded hope for God's salaam/shalom to come there. Goodness that comes from trees, including the fruit, nuts, olive oil, and maple syrup.

Rev. Dave shares the story of Jeremiah telling a disheartened people that God will give them a leader someday who will come from their family tree. He will be a righteous branch: that means he will produce good things (love, caring, respect, hope). We see those qualities in the person of Jesus. We can share those qualities of Jesus with others since we are part of Jesus' family tree.

This is a repeat after me prayer:

God of all, ... as we await your dream for our world to come true, ... teach us to be brave, ... to be creative, ... to never lose hope, ... and to trust you. Amen.

Scripture Reading (Freda Wilson)

Gardens You May Never Get to See - A retelling of Jeremiah 33:14-16

Today we hear the words of the prophet Jeremiah, shared in a time of great crisis. This version, though, is a paraphrase. May God's Word speak to our hearts today.

Jeremiah listened to God. But sometimes he wished he couldn't hear what God had to say. Jeremiah's people were being attacked. A cruel king was about to take over the land. But in the middle of the bad news, Jeremiah could also hear God's good news repeating over and over again, like a bell that wouldn't stop ringing:

"A different day is surely coming. You will still be my people, and I will still be your God. You will know me because my words will be written on the inside of your hearts."

God told Jeremiah to buy a field before the cruel king took over the land. "You will get it back," God said. "Nothing is too hard for me. And because I love doing good for my people, I will plant them in this land and love them with all my heart and all my soul."

Jeremiah was bewildered. It was hard to love a God that made no sense. But then God said one more thing:

"A different day is coming. In this land where you are planted, another Branch will grow. This Branch will be a different kind of ruler who will seek justice, who will live in right ways, a ruler who loves the people and longs to keep them safe."

Jeremiah had not seen this kind of ruler. The rulers he knew were violent and mean and would fight for a long, long time. But maybe, just maybe, if he held on to that little piece of land, this new Branch might grow up in spite of the mean rulers, there in a garden that he might never get to see.

The point is this: the one who sows sparingly will also reap sparingly, and the one who sows bountifully will also reap bountifully. Each of you must give as you have made up your mind, not reluctantly or under compulsion, for God loves a cheerful giver.

Let us pray: (note the suggested gestures)

(hands by ears) May we hear your voice speaking to us today, God. *(touch heart)* May we feel your presence and encouragement. *(Hands out in front of you)* May we live courageously and be filled with hope. Amen.
