Singing in the Temple, Shouting in the Wild

A paraphrase based on Luke 1:68–79 and Luke 3:1–6

Zechariah knew what was happening, but it was still kind of hard to believe. After spending years serving as a priest in the temple, one day an angel showed up out of nowhere to deliver a message:

"Don't be afraid, Zechariah," the angel said. "You have waited a long time, and finally your wife Elizabeth is going to have a baby. But he won't be just any baby. His name should be John, and he will help turn people back to God and to help them love each other better."

Zechariah didn't believe it. "How will I know you're telling the truth?"

The angel was annoyed. "You will know because I am a messenger sent from God to give you good news. But because you didn't listen to me, until the baby is born, you won't be able to talk."

And so it was. Zechariah hadn't said a word since that day. And now at long last, Elizabeth had a baby, and it was time to choose a name. The relatives tried to name the baby after Zechariah, but Elizabeth insisted his name was John. When they turned to see what Zechariah thought, he wrote out the same words Elizabeth had spoken, "His name is John."

And then suddenly, Zechariah felt something open up in his mouth. His tongue felt looser, freer. And after all these months of silence, Zechariah felt the Holy Spirit welling up inside of him, and in a voice that was clear and true, Zechariah started to sing:

"Blessed be our God, who smiles, and we are saved. God has raised up someone to save us, someone from the family of David.

Just as God's messengers have told us, we shall all be saved. God has compassion; God keeps promises, God keeps us safe; God draws us close. And we will serve God for all of our days.

And you, child, will be one who speaks the words of God. You will go ahead of God. You will prepare the way. You will teach us how God's forgiveness can heal...

The child was named John, and he grew. And grew. And grew, until he was a grown man, who lived in the part of the land that nobody had yet tamed.

All around the river, John shouted, "Someone will come shouting in the wild, 'Prepare the way of God! Make crooked paths straight, make valleys rise up, make mountains flat, make the rough ways smooth. For everyone, everyone, everyone will get to see the healing that comes with the forgiveness of God.'"

The father sang in the temple. The son shouted in the wild. But no matter who they were listening to, the people could still hear God's voice!

Let us pray: Wonderful are you, God, for the gifts of children and future – and for the time you entrust into our hands to be stewards of these gifts. Help us to understand your call to each of us today. May we speak well, in word and deed, about your saving grace for us, and may we inspire others to hear your call, to feel your grace too. Amen.

December is one of the holiest months of the year. Along with Christmas, there's the Jewish festival of Hanukkah, winter solstice rituals, as well as spiritually significant days for Buddhists, Muslims, and Zoroastrians. That makes this month a good one to remember what unites us.

And it's important we do. In October, Global Affairs Canada stated that, worldwide, the right to practice, choose, and change one's religion or belief is increasingly under attack.

Chaplain John Dowds said in this trailer: "I think we have a great lack of understanding of other faith traditions. Lack of understanding breeds contempt and fear. The more we understand and the more we talk, there's a greater opportunity to break down some of the walls of fear."

The film is produced by the Edmonton Interfaith Centre for Education and Action, a Mission & Service partner. Your gifts through Mission & Service support the centre—the first of its kind in Canada—to hold interfaith celebrations, dialogues, and learning events.
