### **Prayer for Grace**

Dave has a packsack in his hand.

So it's a good idea to take spiritual inventory, what is in our packsack?

A rock from the first Sunday; out in the wilderness it is uncomfortable, but it is quiet. The rock reminds me that quiet, solitude is important.

Then I found a teardrop – remember, Jesus talked about the place where he was going, Jerusalem, and so sad for the people who would soon hurt him. This teardrop reminds me of the gift of care and compassion in the wilderness.

Now, look we go to our third signpost – what is this? It's a tree, not a very healthy-looking tree at all. There was one day a fig tree looking dry and lifeless like this one, people were going to cut it down. Jesus said, "Don't cut it down. Give it some time, care for it. Truly care for it. For this tree is like us when we are not healthy spiritually, but God is like a merciful gardener who will love us into health again.

What does a plant need to grow? (sun, water, fertile soil)

What do WE need as people to help us be healthy, happy, to grow? (family... love... safety)

We say at times like this that our Creator gives us all that we need. But sometimes we don't notice the blessings around us, instead grumbling about what we don't have. We want rewards now, instead of waiting. We won't be satisfied for long, will we? We can feel empty...

We like to be comfortable and happy, even when we know deep down that something is wrong and perhaps we can help. Choosing comfort all the time while others are hurting, we can feel empty...

On the other hand, sometimes we beat ourselves up with guilt. Yes, we might have done something wrong, but we forget that we all make mistakes and that Jesus tells us to forgive others, but forgive ourselves too. When we pile guilt on ourselves we can feel empty...

### **Time for Quiet Reflection**

- Who are the faithful gardeners in your community? Name them, celebrate them quietly and prayerfully as gardeners of the most vulnerable, including at times ourselves.
- What needs to be nurtured in you in order to feel refreshed?

God has set a glorious table laden with abundant love and forgiveness. We are created out of love, to receive that love, so that we can live that love fully. (Dave fills three glasses with water.) Taste now the peace that lies within grace. Drink to the full all that God offers to us. Let us lift up our hearts in thankfulness. Thanks be to God. Amen.

## **Luke 13:1-9 (New Revised Standard Version)**

This story from Luke speaks about God's kin dom vision as being a place where patience and the nurture of community is in abundance. How can we live into this vision?

At that very time there were some present who told him about the Galileans whose blood Pilate had mingled with their sacrifices. He asked them, "Do you think that because these Galileans suffered in this way they were worse sinners than all other Galileans? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish as they did. Or those eighteen who were killed when the tower of Siloam fell on them—do you think that they were worse offenders than all the others living in Jerusalem? No, I tell you; but unless you repent, you will all perish just as they did."

Then he told this parable: "A man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came looking for fruit on it and found none. So he said to the gardener, 'See here! For three years I have come looking for fruit on this fig tree, and still I find none. Cut it down! Why should it be wasting the soil?'

He replied, 'Sir, let it alone for one more year, until I dig around it and put manure on it. If it bears fruit next year, well and good; but if not, you can cut it down."

Let us pray, God of table and God of open door, thank you for your invitation. You feed the deep places in our spirits and speak the words that evoke turning for the good. Send your Spirit to guide us in turning toward and trusting in you. Amen.

O God, we pray for the faithfulness to nurture all that lies within our prayers today. Help us to truly receive all that you offer us, so that our lives wave in joyful hope in a world that dies with cynicism and shallow solutions. This we pray in the name of the Christ. Amen.
