Prayer for Grace

When Moderator of the United church, the Robert Smith, apologized to Indigenous sisters and brothers for the great harm caused them by the United Church's system of Residential Schools, he said:

We did not hear you when you shared your vision. In our zeal to tell you of the good news of Jesus Christ we were closed to the value of your spirituality. We confused Western ways and culture with the depth and breadth and length and height of the gospel of Christ.

As we ponder the former Moderator's words, made to the First Peoples of this land, I wonder if they describe the ways, yes, even we self-proclaimed followers of Jesus. In our daily lives, so we stubbornly, even at times arrogantly, impose our ideas, our philosophies, our beliefs on others, mistaking our evangelizing for Christ's Call to share good news?

In our zeal for speaking truth, have we ever neglected to listen to others who might have very different truth? I invite you to think of moments when your smugness and certainty were not tempered well with humility and respect for another person's reality...

Forgive us, God,

and open us to Deeper Love and Respect.

Have we ever inserted our personal agendas into our beliefs about God/Jesus – perhaps warping the teachings of Jesus in ways that harmed others or reinforced harmful systems? ...

Forgive us, God,

and open us to Deeper Love and Respect.

Scripture Readings (Marilyn Hurst)

Galatians 6: 1 - 10 (NRSVUE)

My brothers and sisters, if anyone is detected in a transgression, you who have received the Spirit should restore such a one in a spirit of gentleness. Take care that you yourselves are not tempted. Bear one another's burdens, and in this way you will fulfill the law of Christ. For if those who are nothing think they are something, they deceive themselves. All must test their own work; then that work, rather than their neighbor's work, will become a cause for pride. For all must carry their own loads.

Those who are taught the word must share in all good things with their teacher.

Do not be deceived; God is not mocked, for you reap whatever you sow. If you sow to your own flesh, you will reap corruption from the flesh, but if you sow to the Spirit, you will reap eternal life from the Spirit. So let us not grow weary in doing what is right, for we will reap at harvest time, if we do not give up. So then, whenever we have an opportunity, let us work for the good of all and especially for those of the family of faith.

Luke 10: 1 – 11, 17-18 (Common English Bible translation)

[The] Lord commissioned seventy-two others and sent them on ahead in pairs to every city and place he was about to go.

He said to them, "The harvest is bigger than you can imagine, but there are few workers. Therefore, plead with the Lord of the harvest to send out workers for his harvest. Go! Be warned, though, that I'm sending you out as lambs among wolves.

Carry no wallet, no bag, and no sandals. Don't even greet anyone along the way. Whenever you enter a house, first say, 'May peace be on this house.' If anyone there shares God's peace, then your peace will rest on that person. If not, your blessing will return to you. Remain in this house, eating and drinking whatever they set before you, for workers deserve their pay. Don't move from house to house. Whenever you enter a city and its people welcome you, eat what they set before you. Heal the sick who are there, and say to them, 'God's kingdom has come upon you.' Whenever you enter a city and the people don't welcome you, go out into the streets and

say, 'As a complaint against you, we brush off the dust of your city that has collected on our feet. But know this: God's kingdom has come to you.'

The seventy-two returned joyously, saying, "Lord, even the demons submit themselves to us in your name."

Jesus replied, "I saw Satan fall from heaven like lightning...

Let us pray: God of compassion, open us to hear messages from near and far, from the familiar and the unfamiliar, as we seek the healing and wholeness you promise. Amen.

We welcome the One who comes in your name, who calls us to life.

Hosanna in the highest!

God of compassion,
