Inviting Holy Light

We prepare ourselves for worship. We ground ourselves, supported, so loved every one of us, by our Creator. We feel our feet supported by the ground, our bodies supported by our chair, or sofa. Notice how your body feels this morning. Connect with your body. Feel. Breathe deeply. Life giving oxygen going in as you breathe in, breathe out.

Today, as we celebrate Creation, and praise the Creator, we imagine together ocean. The beauty, the majesty, the sounds, the creatures nurtured within ocean. We join the voice of ocean, giving thanks to Creator God as we invite holy light. [lights candle]

Nurturing Safe Space

We are all children of God. All are welcome in worship here – all backgrounds, gender identities – this space is open to all.

Acknowledging Traditional Territory

Here we are worshiping on the traditional land of the First Peoples. Across Turtle Island, Treaties were made between colonizers and those who had lived on the land for millennia. Here at St. Andrew's, we give thanks to the Wahnapitae First Nation and to the Atikameksheng Anishnawbek, this land where the Robinson Huron Treaty was made in 1850, and never honoured by Canada.

We have a responsibility implied by those ancient and sacred Treaties to share the caretaking of this land with Indigenous neighbours. We give thanks for the current and historic contributions that First Nations and Métis people have made. May we journey and act together towards reconciliation.

Call to Worship – Connecting

I invite you now to pay attention to the cup of sea salt you received as you entered this worship space. You at home too with your salt.

Taste it, think about the oceans that cover more than 70% of our earth's surface. Oceans still filled with mystery in their depths that we cannot reach.

Think of a special memory of a time at the seashore. If you haven't been to the coast of an ocean, then a lake that you have visited. Is there a memory you have there that stirs in you a sense of wonder?

We remember the sea with amazement.

We imagine, some of us remember:

the splash of waves on our feet,

the sand between our toes:

and the mystery of an endless horizon stretching out across the ocean.

We imagine, we remember, and rejoice!

Thank you, God, for the oceans,

living waters that are part of who we are.

Today Creator calls us, and we respond.

We respond with our prayers and our commitment.

We respond with our hopes and our dreams.

We respond with our hearts and our minds.

Today Christ welcomes us, and we enter.

We enter into this place of quiet and refuge.

We enter into this time of reflection and vision.

We enter into this space of inspiration and insight.

Today the Spirit is alive in our midst and we are thankful.

We are thankful for opportunities to serve. We are thankful for moments of personal renewal. We are thankful for invitations to share the goodness of life with one another.

Let us be nourished by the community, the connection that we share.

Let us express our gratitude for the blessings given us by God.

We come, open to a future hope today.

We come, seeking to be a part of God's mission.

Opening Prayer – Seeking Grace

Let us pray. Creator of waves and swells, coral reefs and slippery fish, we come again to worship and wonder because we don't have answers and we crave them. We want to know how deep and how wide but more often just skim the surface of what you separated – the waters from the sky.

The salt of Oceans is like that of tears shed by species that are dying in warming waters.

The reefs wave white flags of surrender – pale coral, missing the colours of vitality with which it was born now submerged in the silt of runoff and the results of our presence.

The distant depths, once pristine and protected by remoteness itself, now labour, holding the waste from thousands of cruise ships and so many single careless actions by unthinking people that they cannot be counted.

Bring forth in us the swarms of possibility full of your goodness and grace. Create in us this day wonder for Oceans and its deep wisdom, and may we listen. This we pray...

Time up Front

Dave brings bowl from baptismal font to the "tent" with kids:

The Bible asks many times, can we imagine how truly big this earth is?

Touch your hand to the water. Tell me what you feel when you touch the water. Wet? soft? Or cold? Would it surprise you, shock you, if I poured this on your head? Or does it soothe or calm?

I wonder what the water would think if it had a brain like us. How does it feel about us? What might water say to us if it could talk today?

Run your fingers over the top of the bowl to make waves. Consider all that we do to try to control water with dams. Is it wise? I wonder what the water would have to say about how we control it. *Pause*. What does it say to you? How often do you touch water in one day? *Pause*. You have washed your hands a lot in this recent pandemic.

What does water do? *Pause.* Why is water important to you? Enquire of the water what feels most important to it.

This is a repeat after me prayer:

We give thanks for water, God,

That keeps us alive.

That refreshes us.

That surprises us.

That cools us when we are hot.

Water that is home to millions of strange and beautiful creatures.

Help us to care for water, God.

Scripture Reading (James Warner-Smith) Paraphrase: Job from the Point of View of Ocean

This is a story inspired by the book of Job, the challenge to us to honour Creation, from the perspective of the Ocean.

You people think you are so important! You treat the world as if it is yours to abuse, without any care about others. You don't think about the future generations who will have to live with the world you leave behind. It's time you paid attention to what is all around you, instead of thinking only of yourselves. I am Ocean, and I want to invite you to think for a moment.

Have you ever thought how amazing it is, that I am home to countless animals that affect your life? From fish that you eat to plants and animals that are the source of serious medicines. Do you ever stop to think of the plankton and krill, some of the smallest living things on the planet, and how they are the food source of the great whales, the largest living things on the planet?

How about the tides that balance things out, giving water for swimming and boating and playing, and low tides for walking for kilometers/miles? Have you ever gone into the depths – or swum with a mask and a snorkel – and seen some of the amazing creatures of the deep? Have you ever stopped to think how amazing they are, how ingenious, how clever?

Too often you focus only on yourselves. Broaden your horizons! Awake to the wonder and the beauty that are all around you. When you do, often you'll find a lot of your concerns about yourself disappear, and you care more about the world in which you live. And when you do that, our Creator is pleased!

Let us pray:

God of crashing waves and miraculous depths, let us encounter you in these words of scripture, in our worship, and in our living this coming week. May we explore the depths of our faith, your love, and your creation in all we do. Amen.
