Time up Front – The History of St. Andrew's

In Celebration of St. Andrew's Day, November 20, 2022, here are five snapshots of memorable times and events in the history of St. Andrew's. This was written by Bev Chapman. Information was obtained from *The History of St. Andrew's*, *Sudbury* by Dr. Graeme Mount and Mike Mulloy;

an article from the May 25, 1973, edition of *The Sudbury Star*, the 2017 Annual Report of St. Andrew's United Church; and a phone conversation with Sandra Simpson.

Although St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church and Cedar Street Methodist Church both became United Churches in 1925, it wasn't until June 1927 that the two became one under the leadership of Reverend W.A. Whidden who served as Minister until 1933. A number of other ministers served St. Andrew's in subsequent years but the most notable of these was surely Dr. Earl Lautenslager who was the minister from 1938-1941 and 1954-1963.

Among his many achievements, two stand out. He envisioned an Extensive Church Extension Program and under his guidance, St. Andrew's provided gifts and loans to assist other United Churches become established. St. Paul's, St. Peter's, St. Luke's, and St. Stephen's on the Hill were all recipients of this financial support. As well, Dr. Lautenslager was a key figure in the creation of Huntington University in the sixties, serving as its President until 1963. St. Andrew's is proud to have continued its connection to Huntington to this day.

"The Cathedral of the North"

By 1971 it was apparent that the original building which housed St. Andrew's was no longer structurally sound or safe. Other possible sites were looked at for the purposes of rebuilding but, ultimately, it was decided that the new church would be built on the existing site.

The Reverend Dr. Charles Forsyth was called to come to St. Andrew's to provide the vision and leadership necessary. And what a vision it was! Under Dr. Forsyth's guidance, the new St. Andrew's that took shape was a church unlike any other in the north. On May 27, 1973, the first service was held in the sanctuary. But the structure, formally named St. Andrew's Place, was composed of much more than a sanctuary.

Truly a multi-purpose venue, it is home to several floors of apartments for seniors, retail spaces, a social group called "Club 111", a large activity hall suitable for receptions, a fully outfitted kitchen, several meeting spaces, and a Peace Chapel. Moreover, the sanctuary can readily be used for concerts and other community events. Over the years those occupying commercial space in the building have included a restaurant, social service agencies, a barbershop, the YMCA, Laurentian University's School of Architecture, and a coffee shop.

A Fair to Remember

In 1975 some enterprising souls at St. Andrew's conceived the notion of a fall fair which would replace stand-alone teas and bake sales. Not only would the fair serve as a significant fund-raiser for the church but also provide St. Andrew's with an opportunity to reach out to the community by hosting a weekend-long event to which everyone was welcome. And so, the St. Andrew's Community Fall Fair was born, a tradition that remained in place for twenty-some years. Attractions included a bake table, a dining room, a silent auction, a rummage table, a sewing and knitting stall, a children's area, an ice cream parlour, and a book table, to name only a few. Local crafters were invited to rent tables to sell their wares. And there were always unusual offerings such as a weight guessing booth. One year our minister at the time even went around selling hair! Every year the fair had a theme such as an English country garden, a castle, a world tour, and a science fiction wonderland.

Hosting Our Neighbours – "Out of the Cold"

For many years running, St. Andrew's, along with the Church of the Epiphany, provided a venue where people could come on Friday nights between November and April and be served an excellent meal. Several area churches provided teams which took on this work on a rotating basis. The teams welcomed an average of 175-250 guests each week. Several businesses and institutions within the community provided generous sponsorship. As well, the revenue generated by a series of concerts acted as an ongoing sponsor for the dinners. Each week our guests expressed their enthusiasm and appreciation. Regrettably, despite the ongoing needs of the

community, the "Out of the Cold" program has had to be suspended at present because of the pandemic. However, St. Andrew's continues to support our mission partners using remaining Out of the Cold funds by providing vitamins to clients at the Mission and nutritious snacks at the shelters and warming centres.

"And Unto Us This Day a Child is Born"

In 2017 Sandra Simpson envisioned a Nativity Walk to be held at St. Andrew's after reading a magazine article about a Walk held by a church in the U.S. Members of the congregation were invited to share their nativity scenes – new, old, store-bought, handmade, etc. Over 100 exhibits were brought in and a display was set up in the sanctuary and staffed with over 30 volunteers.

On November 24 and 25 of that year the community was invited to come and take part in "the walk". 236 visitors came, including 16 children, for whom some interactive nativity scenes were provided. Although there was only a goodwill offering, as opposed to a set admission fee, over \$600.00 was donated. Visitors were offered a chance to share their responses to the experience on a reflection board. Comments included "inspiring", "awesome", "beautiful", "holy", "just what I needed", "the true meaning of Christmas", and "my heart is filled". Inspired by the response, the organizing committee decided to hold the event again. Unfortunately, the Nativity Walk" has had to be discontinued indefinitely because of the pandemic.

But, despite the pandemic, many activities still took place. And now we're into our Advent Projects by the Fun-D-Raising and Reaching Out teams. Thank you for being part of this wonderful St. Andrew's Community! And thanks again to Bev Chapman for writing "The History of St. Andrew's" for the service today.
