Lighting the First Candle of Advent – Called to Worship

Worship Leader: Over a hundred people, from the ages of two to eighty years old, were asked the question, "What gives you hope?" From the voices of different generations, hear their answers:

Maureen: My two-year-old son. Dogs wagging their tails. Talking with young people.

Torrin: Kindness from strangers. Spending time in the woods. Waffles.

Eric: Hands clasped in prayer. Social progress. The way my son calls everybody "buddy."

Maureen: The ringing of church bells. Babies trying over and over to take their first step. The turning of seasons.

Torrin: Christian community. Books. Friendship with my grandparents.

Eric: Advocates for justice. Hearing children in the pews sing the hymns.

The sunrise every single morning.

Maureen: What gives you hope?

Torrin: Today we light the candle of hope to remind ourselves that God is at work in this world. [Torrin lights the candle]

From generation to generation, God has brought good news of love and compassion, justice, and community. Let us rest and abide in that good news. Amen.

Opening Prayer

God of the ages, in scripture we hear stories of people like us—ordinary people, people who longed to know you, people who longed to follow you, people who made mistakes, people who tried to grow—old, young, native, immigrant, new to the faith, lifelong believer. In scripture we hear stories of people like us, so just as you walked with them, help us to hear and remember all the ways that you walk with us. We are listening. We are grateful. We are yours.

Will you join your voice as we offer the traditional version of the prayer that Jesus taught:

Our Father, who art in heaven, hallowed be thy name. Thy kin-dom come, thy will be done on earth as it is heaven. Give us this day our daily bread; but forgive us our trespasses as we forgive those who trespass against us; and lead us not into temptation, but deliver us from evil. For thine is the kin-dom, the power and the glory. Amen.

Time Up Front

We are going to celebrate again, as if it is happening for the first time, a special baby coming? Who? (hmmm) There is a very special line that this child comes from. In the Bible passage we hear about Jesus' ancestors, the males the boys. No girls.

The artwork on screen is by Rev. Lauren Wright Pittman. She wanted to show the women of Jesus' family who have not been talked a lot about. Some of them had tough lives, and, well, they were women. In the Bible, you have to look pretty carefully to find the stories of the women. Here we celebrate their stories.

In the centre, is a rose – that is a symbol for the baby coming. Who was that again? Surrounding the rose in a circle are some women who don't get credit for being brave, his family tree, the women. There is Tamar who assumed her father's role as leader of the tribe of Judah. Next is Rahab who holds the red chord she lowered to ensure the safety of her family after assisting the Israelites to achieve victory at Jericho. Then comes Ruth who must remarry to be protected and so takes the initiative with Boaz. The fourth woman is Bathsheba who survives great hardship and ensures that her son Solomon takes the throne. Finally, there is Mary who smiles lovingly on her son, Christ, remember the symbol on this picture representing Jesus? The rose.

These are all women in his family some from very, very long ago, who were incredibly brave, smart, strong, and who made huge sacrifices for their families and for God. So, let's keep our eyes open this coming week to see the kids and grown ups around us who are brave, but people don't' give them credit for the stuff they do. The kid who comes to school with an awful lunch, maybe life at home is not great. The crossing guard who smiles at you every morning, have you said thank you?

This is a repeat-after-me prayer:

Dear God,...thank you for this exciting time,...a time to prepare for Jesus coming,...but also a time to keep our eyes open...to God's children – ...young ones and old ones – ...who are brave, and strong,...but don't get noticed. May we notice them, Jesus' family, our family...God, you are awesome. Thank you. Amen.

Scripture Readings

Isaiah 2:1-5 – New International Version

The Isaiah passage illustrates a convergence of opposing groups and identities coming together. Instead of the way of the past—of war—they learn a new way by transforming their weapons into gardening tools.

This is what Isaiah son of Amoz saw concerning Judah and Jerusalem:

In the last days the mountain of the Lord's temple will be established as the highest of the mountains; it will be exalted above the hills, and all nations will stream to it.

Many peoples will come and say.

"Come, let us go up to the mountain of the Lord, to the temple of the God of Jacob. God will teach us his ways, so that we may walk in God's paths."

The law will go out from Zion, the word of the Lord from Jerusalem.

God will judge between the nations and will settle disputes for many peoples. They will beat their swords into plowshares and their spears into pruning hooks.

Nation will not take up sword against nation, nor will they train for war anymore.

Come, descendants of Jacob, let us walk in the light of the Lord.

Matthew 1:1-17 - Contemporary English Version (CEV)

Our gospel begins with Matthew's genealogy. In that long list of names, we remember the trauma and triumph of those who came before; each name holds a story and their story gives way to Christ's story. God works through the unexpected people and stories of the past and present

Jesus Christ came from the family of King David and also from the family of Abraham. And this is a list of his ancestors. From Abraham to King David, his ancestors were:

Abraham, Isaac, Jacob, Judah and his brothers (Judah's sons were Perez and Zerah, *and their mother was Tamar*), Hezron;

Ram, Amminadab, Nahshon, Salmon, Boaz (his mother was Rahab), Obed (his mother was Ruth), Jesse, and King David.

From David to the time of the exile in Babylonia, the ancestors of Jesus were:

David, Solomon (his mother had been Uriah's wife), Rehoboam, Abijah, Asa, Jehoshaphat, Jehoram; ...

...Uzziah, Jotham, Ahaz, Hezekiah, Manasseh, Amon, Josiah, and Jehoiachin and his brothers.

From the exile to the birth of Jesus, his ancestors were: ...

...Eliud, Eleazar, Matthan, Jacob, and Joseph, the husband of Mary, the mother of Jesus, who is called the Messiah.

There were 14 generations from Abraham to David. There were also 14 from David to the exile in Babylonia and 14 more to the birth of the Messiah.
