## Time up Front

Dave talks about fishing and what is needed: tackle, bait, maps of waterways. Why do we fish?

In our story today, we hear about two brothers who fished and then became disciples of God. They were then to fish for people. Strange image.

How did they do that? How might we fish for people and help people learn about God's love? ### Scriptures (Marian McKnight)

### First Reading – Isaiah 9:1-4 (New International Version)

This reading from Isaiah marks a hinge point in God's relationship with the people of Zebulun and Naphtali. Here the prophet speaks of the light of a new king, probably referring to a new prince born after 732 BCE, following a time of war. This king was to inaugurate a time of peace and justice.

...there will be no more gloom for those who were in distress. In the past the Lord humbled the land of Zebulun and the land of Naphtali, but in the future God will honor Galilee of the nations, by the Way of the Sea, beyond the Jordan —

The people walking in darkness have seen a great light; on those living in the land of deep darkness a light has dawned.

You have enlarged the nation and increased their joy; they rejoice before you as people rejoice at the harvest, as warriors rejoice when dividing the plunder.

For as in the day of Midian's defeat, you have shattered the yoke that burdens them, the bar across their shoulders, the rod of their oppressor.

### Second Reading – John 1:29-42 (NIV)

Jesus' first disciples are disciples of John. They are drawn to learn more about the one whom John calls "the Lamb of God." Jesus invites them to "come and see."

The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and said, "Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world! This is the one I meant when I said, 'A man who comes after me has surpassed me because he was before me.' I myself did not know him, but the reason I came baptizing with water was that he might be revealed to Israel."

Then John gave this testimony: "I saw the Spirit come down from heaven as a dove and remain on him. And I myself did not know him, but the one who sent me to baptize with water told me, 'The man on whom you see the Spirit come down and remain is the one who will baptize with the Holy Spirit.' I have seen and I testify that this is the Son of God."

The next day John was there again with two of his disciples. When he saw Jesus passing by, he said, "Look, the Lamb of God!"

When the two disciples heard him say this, they followed Jesus. Turning around, Jesus saw them following and asked, "What do you want?"

They said, "Rabbi" (which means "Teacher"), "where are you staying?"

"Come," he replied, "and you will see."

So they went and saw where he was staying, and they spent that day with him. It was about four in the afternoon. Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, was one of the two who heard what John had said and who had followed Jesus. The first thing Andrew did was to find his brother Simon and tell him, "We have found the Messiah" (that is, the Christ). And he brought him to Jesus.

Jesus looked at him and said, "You are Simon son of John. You will be called Cephas" (which, when translated, is Peter).

Let us pray: Inviting God, you call us to follow, to witness and to wonder. You call us to follow and risk all we know so that the change we need can finally be seen. Amen.

## Sending People to School – Together: Patti Talbot's Work

How do you make the world a better place? You can start by taking kids to school.

Around the world, 57 million children cannot attend school.<sup>1</sup> They may never learn to read, to add or subtract, or to write. These are the skills they need to succeed. Even more importantly, they never learn about their basic human rights.

It's a complicated problem, says Patti Talbot, the United Church's Global Partnership Team Leader. "The work we do isn't going to lead to immediate societal change," she says, "but it will make a big difference down the road."

When children can't go to school, society suffers. And that is why Mission & Service is in partnership with 85 organizations that work to increase access to education across the globe. Each partner has their own approach to education and skills training, each supported by your gifts to Mission & Service.

Colombia's Center for Communication uses arts and media to teach children about their rights. Women for Change in Zambia creates educational groups where participants share agricultural knowledge and awareness of their rights. At Japan's Asian Rural Institute, local leaders gather to learn sustainable agriculture techniques they can take home and transform their communities.

"How can we make the world a better place?" asks Talbot before responding, "We can't do that by ourselves; our partners know best what the challenges are... The United Church's focus is more than just sharing resources, but really sharing life together."

It's an approach that Talbot knows works, even if results take time. "Our partners are very grateful that the United Church of Canada has demonstrated over and over again that we are there for the long term," Talbot says. "Partners say to us 'It makes such a difference to us to know that the United Church is with us, walking with us in prayer, supporting us, remembering us in their lives." Thank you for your commitment to God's work that our United Church of Canada is part of, making a difference in solidarity with partners near and far.
