Opening Prayer

Adult Time up Front – Have A Heart Day Dialogue/Reflection/Video (Suzanne & Rhodine)

Setting: Rhodine is sitting on a chair on the dais with a plate of heart shaped cookies. Suzanne approaches and sits in the other chair.

Suzanne: Hi Rhodine, those look like pretty good cookies. Are you giving them away?

Rhodine: Yes, I made them for Have a Heart Day.

Suzanne: Oh, are they valentine cookies – you know HEART? VALENTINE?

Rhodine: Well sort of. Mars and I made valentine cookies for Have a Heart Day.

Suzanne: I think you did that last year!

Rhodine: Yes, the valentine cookies are to remind us that Have a Heart Day is a reconciliation event that brings together caring Canadians to help ensure First Nations children have the opportunity to grow up safely at home, get a good education, be healthy, and be proud of who they are.

Suzanne: I thought that was something new, but then I saw that Have a Heart Day has been going on since 2011 when the first event was held. It is an event for children especially, and they are encouraged to do certain activities like making cookies and sending cards to the Prime minister. Have a Heart Day is an initiative of the First Nations Child and Family Caring Society.

Rhodine: Yes, that's right. Have you heard about the Spirit Bear?

Suzanne: I don't think so?

Rhodine: There is a really great story about the Spirit Bear. Here is the picture and the story of Cindy Blackstock who started the Spirit Bear story.

Rhodine: The Caring Society of Canada stands with First Nations children and families for equal opportunities to succeed. Children on reserves do not receive the same level funding for education and social services that children off reserves receive.

Suzanne: Cindy Blackstock is someone who has spoken out loudly to have this funding changed. She is a very big voice. The Spirit Bear is one of her voices. So here is the Spirit Bear Plan: The Spirit Bear Plan calls on government, parliament, government departments and agencies to end the inequalities in Public Services for First Nations Children, Youth and Families.

Rhodine: Today we are going to give everyone a chance to participate in our Have a Heart Day event. When you leave church this morning you can pick up some cookies on your way to coffee.

Suzanne: Also, you can pick a card that you can sign to send to the Prime Minister and other leaders, reminding them to end the unfair practices and comply with the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal rulings. And there is a prayer for you to take that has been prepared by our National Church for this day.

Rhodine: The First Nations Child and Family Caring Society is a very important link and helps us work for reconciliation.

Prayer After Scripture

May we strive to live together in harmony, Indigenous and settler people, listening to the Great Spirit, walking in peace on the path of acceptance and healing. Amen.

Message: "God Loves ALL Creation"

Paul, in his letter to churches in southern Galatia, states in Galatians 3:28: "There is no longer Jew or Greek, there is no longer slave or free, there is no longer male and female; for all of you are one in Christ Jesus." This wonderful proclamation of inclusivity needs to be heard. This statement rings true for us here, today.

In these times of racial awareness and acknowledgement of discrimination, it is time for us to focus on our common humanity and look for ways we can love our neighbours instead of fearing them, or talking about us and Indigenous peoples have a saying,

All My Relations. The Indigenous contribution to the church is honoured by the Mohawk phrase "Akwe Nia'Tetewá:neren" (aw gway-- nyah day day waw-- nay renh) —all my relations—on the crest. The four colours of the Medicine Wheel, yellow, red, black, and white, and the Mohawk words have been incorporated in the United Church crest since 2012. Indigenous spirituality, leadership, and participation are vital to the church's life.

What this says to me is that we are all united. It goes further than Paul's teaching and evangelism. Paul was speaking about people. All my relations include all living things: people, creatures in the

water, those that fly in the air, everything that creeps and crawls and slithers on the ground. We all have a place in God's great creation. I was taught it is like creation is a giant spider's web. If you pluck at one thread, the vibrations are felt throughout the whole web. It's like the ripples that spread out when a pebble is thrown into or skipped in water.

So how we work toward justice and reconciliation? Like the paraphrase of Psalm 106 says, "Joyful are those who observe justice, who work for right relations at all times." We are educating ourselves about culture, racism, and reconciliation. Some of us might bristle at what feels at times like awkward terminology – reconciliation, right relations – are these just trendy words or do we really mean it?

I was moved by a book entitled "Seven Fallen Feathers" by Tanya Talega about how cases of 7 indigenous high school students who went missing, and the system abandoned them including policing.

I know that some of you, like me, are fans of Richard Wagamese – I really enjoyed his book, "Medicine Walk" about a journey of forgiveness and healing. Indigenous art, books, attending events like pow wows, we already engage, we need to continue this work of listening to those voices that call us to see All My Relations.

Donate to local Indigenous organizations such as healing and friendship centres. We can also support urban Indigenous people through Indigenous community centres and programs. We can contribute individually or collectively to the United Church of Canada's Healing Fund, which directly supports projects led by Indigenous church members and others in their communities. The Healing Fund promotes healing initiatives for survivors of the residential school system and initiatives that address ongoing intergenerational impacts. Indigenous communities can apply for a grant of up to \$15,000 toward programs centred on cultural, healing, and language projects. The Healing Programs Working Group, made up of representatives from diverse Indigenous communities across the country, determines the fund's criteria and evaluates applications.

Have a Heart Day is on Tuesday, Valentine's Day. I invite you to sign a card, one to the Prime Minister and one to your local MP after worship while you enjoy some treats and conversation. We need to pay attention, and hold prayerfully the victims and families when we hear on the news about more unmarked graves of indigenous children who died in Residential Schools. We are not doing nothing, we are paying attention, and we are praying, and perhaps we will find ways to offer our support.

We say thank you, or Meegwetch (the Ojibwe term for "thank you") for the Indigenous people of our community and their profound contributions to our common life together. We are on a journey, probably only the beginning of that journey, towards mending the broken relationships. May we hear Paul's call to see all as one, not meaning that we are all the same – we are very diverse. But we are ALL God's beloved children. We are all part of Creation that the Creator loves so much. Thanks be to God.

Minute for Right Relations

Have a Heart Day – February 14, 2023

Did you know that the Government of Canada gives less funding for important services like child welfare, education, and healthcare to First Nations children than other kids in Canada? That is why the First Nations Child and Family Caring Society of Canada and the Assembly of First Nations filed a human rights complaint against the Government of Canada in 2007. In 2016, the Canadian Human Rights Commission (CHRC) tribunal found that Canada's funding practices discriminate against First Nations kids and constituted systemic human rights violations.

On January 4th, 2022 the Government of Canada and the parties to the complaint came to a \$40 billion agreement-in-principal regarding the First Nations Child and Family Services program and Jordan's Principle. The final settlement agreement on compensation would provide \$20 billion to compensate children, youth and some families who were removed from their homes and an additional \$20 billion to address long-term reform of the First Nations Child and Family Services program.

In October 2022, the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal decided against approving this settlement agreement citing concerns around the distribution of compensation and timeline. Meanwhile, children, youth and families are still waiting to be compensated.

The case is ongoing with some parties supporting the original compensation agreement and others opposing it, stating it does not do enough. The Assembly of First Nations and other Indigenous organizations (including the First Nations Caring Society) are calling on the Government to pay those who are eligible to receive funding immediately while the details get worked out. People have waited too long for this compensation.

This year is as important as any other to celebrate Have a Heart Day! What can you do?
