Nurturing Safe Space

In all we do as St. Andrew's United Church, may we celebrate the uniqueness, the quirks, the differences of one another. Call to Worship

Time up Front

Thomas not as "doubter", rather, a *curious person* who wanted to see for himself what others had already seen. Recall what it is like when everyone is talking about an exciting event that you were not at. Insist that Jesus welcomed Thomas' questions and ours.

There is no honest question God/Jesus cannot handle. Thomas was the disciple who cared enough to interrupt Jesus when he did not understand what Jesus was saying (John 14:5). He really wanted to understand Jesus.

Finally, upon seeing Jesus' wounds after the resurrection, Thomas replies, "My Lord and my God!" That was his statement of faith.

It's good to ask questions. Thomas wasn't the only confused, questioning disciple after Easter. Other confused disciples – Mary at the empty tomb.

Look at this artwork (on-screen) showing that scene – look at the friends of Thomas around, imagine how they felt. Perhaps some are impatient, that Thomas missed his chance, why is Jesus paying attention to him rather than me?

In honour of Thomas, brave enough to ask a question, and to be able to touch, let's ask questions: What kinds of questions might we ask of Jesus if we were Thomas?

For example: What was it like to be dead? Was it scary? Did you know what was going to happen, or did you (Jesus) accept dying having faith that God would raise you from the dead?

Do NOT answer any of them – even if you can. Instead promise to deal with them during the coming weeks.

This is a repeat-after-me prayer:
God, thank you for being with us
In good times and difficult ones.
Be with us on this journey through Easter.
Amen.

Scripture Readings (Sophia and Benjamin Le Grand) First Reading 1 Peter 1: 3-9 (The Message Translation)

Let us pray: O God, open our eyes and move our hands to receive your peace. Help us to hear the blessing you offer in our lives so that we might reach beyond fear and feel joy. Amen.

<u>Second Reading: A paraphrase based on John 20:19–31</u> – "Jesus Appears to the Disciples" On the first day of the week, Sunday, the disciples gathered in a locked room for fear of what would happen to them because of their known relationship with Jesus. This was the Sunday following the crucifixion, Easter Sunday.

Suddenly, Jesus appeared among them and said, "Peace be with you." Jesus could see the look of bewilderment on their faces as they said to one another, "Do you see what I see?" Jesus began to identify himself by showing them the crucifixion marks on his hand and his side. Upon seeing his marks, the disciples rejoiced that Jesus was here with them.

Isn't it just like Jesus to show up when all seems hopeless, when we think we are at a dead-end?

Jesus said again to the disciples, "Peace be with you." He then reminded the disciples that it was through a relationship with God that he did his work. Just as Jesus was in the world to do God's work, they would be sent into the world to continue Jesus' work. Jesus then shared the spirit of peace with them, which would remain with them and give them power to continue sharing Jesus' love and life with others.

One of the disciples, Thomas, wasn't present for this meeting with Jesus. The other disciples told Thomas that they had seen Jesus. Thomas was reluctant to believe. He had doubts, just like we do from time to time. He told his friends that unless he sees the nail marks and puts his hand in Jesus' side, he will not believe.

Approximately one week later, the disciples found themselves in the same locked room, and this time Thomas was with them. Jesus appeared and said, "Peace be with you."

He then directed the conversation to Thomas. "Thomas, see my hands. Put your finger here and place your hand into my side. Thomas, it is time to stop doubting and believe."

Thomas replied, "My Lord! My God!"

Jesus looked at him and said, "You have believed because I am here. Blessed are those who believe but have not seen." Jesus' miracles are written throughout the New Testament so we may come to know Jesus – the Messiah, the Christ – and have life with God.

Will you pray with me? People of God, fearful and faithful, doubting and dutiful, the Holy Spirit of God breathes life, healing and forgiveness into us. Receive God's peace and wholeness. In trust and joy, we receive God's peace. Amen.

Minute for Right Relations: "Tobacco Tie"

I want to share with you briefly a learning of mine in recent years, as well as others of us here at St Andrew's. Tobacco...

Tobacco is one of four sacred medicines (along with Sage, Cedar and Sweetgrass). Tobacco always comes first. Tobacco is used in ceremony and ritual, as an offering of gratitude or respect, and to lift up prayers. It is offered before harvesting other medicines. Tobacco should always be handled with respect and with a good mind.

The Tobacco Tie - how and when to offer it:

When asking an Indigenous elder or knowledge keeper to share a teaching, lead ceremony, offer advice, or to share a song or prayer, it is appropriate to offer tobacco. If the person accepts the tobacco, they are agreeing to help. Offering tobacco is a respectful way of asking for assistance and should never replace proper remuneration.

How to Make a Tobacco Tie

It is preferable to use traditional ceremonial tobacco. If you are unable to find traditional tobacco, it is fine to offer loose tobacco. (You may purchase traditional ceremonial tobacco online or in some Indigenous shops or you may purchase loose tobacco from a tobacco store).

Gather fabric to make your tobacco tie. It is best to use natural fabric – cotton broadcloth is best to use. The fabric should be about 4 inches (or 10 cm) square. Typically, tobacco ties are made with red fabric, but it is ok to use other colours as well.

The person making the request or offering the tobacco should be the person to prepare the tobacco tie. As the tobacco offering is prepared, it is important to think about what you are requesting, and to have a good mind while you prepare the tobacco bundle.

Place a small amount of the tobacco in the centre of the cloth and gather the ends of the cloth together. Tie the tobacco bundle with a piece of yarn, twine or a strip of cloth fabric.

How to Offer the Tobacco Tie

Offer the tobacco tie or pouch when you make your initial request. To make a request, offer the tobacco tie or pouch by holding it in your left hand in front of you – you should not try and place it in the person's hands until after the request is accepted.

Clearly state your request. Be specific and as detailed as possible. If the person agrees to your request, they will accept the tobacco. If they can not fulfil your request, they will decline the tobacco.

If you are asking an Elder or Knowledge Keeper to share knowledge over zoom or other online platform, you should still make and offer the tobacco tie. You can make arrangements to deliver the tobacco tie at a later date.

As we prepare ourselves prayerfully for Holy Week, for this emotional journey, pondering this important indigenous tradition might be our way of carrying First Peoples sisters and brothers in our hearts in our holy journey.

May we be generous in our words and actions. With gratitude for all that this community, St. Andrew's does, the volunteers the staff, the treasures that we collect to help God's kin-dom of justice and love to be realized...let us sing in our offerings.

We now offer our own prayers for ourselves, our families and neighbours and our larger global village, in this silent moment. (silence)

Do not abandon us, but show the path that leads to life.
