Inviting Holy Light

Anything I offer is an invitation, never an obligation.

I invite you to take a couple of slow, big breaths, not into your chest, but into your stomach, your diaphragm. In... out. As you continue to notice your breathing, the oxygen cleansing your vital

organs, I invite you to notice how your different body parts feel. You could start with your feet, how are they feeling? Notice them. Give thanks for what they do for you. The same then for your legs, your knees. They put up with so much. What a gift, your body. Give thanks for it. Move up to the trunk of your body – your hips, your stomach. How are they feeling as you feel supported by whatever you are sitting on? You are grounded...held in love. Your hands, fingers, arms, shoulders – how are they feeling? Your chest, your neck, your eyes, nose, mouth, ears – your head. What a remarkable instrument the Creator has given you. Quietly notice how they are feeling, and give thanks.

Scripture Reading (Rhodine White)

Luke 24:13-35 (The Message translation)

Let us pray as we prepare to listen: O God, you come and walk beside us. You accompany us into the unknown and challenge us to see the world with new eyes. Remind us of your vision, again and again. Amen.

Jesus' friends are on a road, grieving and traumatized by the death of their teacher. That same day two of them were walking to the village Emmaus, about seven miles out of Jerusalem. They were deep in conversation, going over all these things that had happened. In the middle of their talk and questions, Jesus came up and walked along with them. But they were not able to recognize who he was.

He asked, "What's this you're discussing so intently as you walk along?"

They just stood there, long-faced, like they had lost their best friend. Then one of them, his name was Cleopas, said, "Are you the only one in Jerusalem who hasn't heard what's happened during the last few days?"

He said, "What has happened?"

They said, "The things that happened to Jesus the Nazarene. He was a man of God, a prophet, dynamic in work and word, blessed by both God and all the people. Then our high priests and leaders betrayed him, got him sentenced to death, and crucified him. And we had our hopes up that he was the One, the One about to deliver Israel. And it is now the third day since it happened. But now some of our women have completely confused us. Early this morning they were at the tomb and couldn't find his body. They came back with the story that they had seen a vision of angels who said he was alive. Some of our friends went off to the tomb to check and found it empty just as the women said, but they didn't see Jesus."

Then he said to them, "Thick-headed and slow-hearted. Why can't you simply believe all that the prophets said? Don't you see that these things had to happen, that the Messiah had to suffer and only then enter into his glory?" Then he started at the beginning, with the Books of Moses, and went on through all the Prophets, pointing out everything in the Scriptures that referred to him.

They came to the edge of the village where they were headed. He acted as if he were going on, but they pressed him: "Stay and have supper with us. It's nearly evening; the day is done."

So, he went in with them. And here is what happened: He sat down at the table with them. Taking the bread, he blessed and broke and gave it to them. At that moment, open-eyed, wide-eyed, they recognized him. And then he disappeared.

Back and forth they talked. "Didn't we feel on fire as he conversed with us on the road, as he opened up the Scriptures for us?"

They didn't waste a minute. They were up and on their way back to Jerusalem. They found the Eleven and their friends gathered together, talking away: "It's really happened! The Master has been raised up—Simon saw him!" Then the two went over everything that happened on the road and how they recognized him when he broke the bread.

Will you pray with me? Creator, we are kindred travellers, enlivened by your constant Word of faith, hope, and of love. Equip us now to journey into life in fresh ways. May we take your gift of presence, peace, and forgiveness into our hearts, receiving you gladly. Help us to live our lives with passion and boldness. Christ is risen! (pause) Christ is risen indeed! Alleluia!

Minute for Mission: Working with Young Leaders

Jesus says, "Let the children come to me."

But as Amy Crawford knows, you can't be passive when trying to bring young people to the church. "We took it for granted that youth and young adults were going to be in the church," the Team Lead for Identity and Mission says. "And we can't take that for granted anymore."

But Crawford is not painting a dark picture here. "Our youth ministry in the United Church in many ways has **grown** in recent years," she says. "The youth are here because they choose to be here. And they're here because they find a place for themselves."

Crawford has been doing ministry with youth and young adults for almost 30 years, and she's never been more excited about the future for youth leadership in the church. Recently, 45 youth at the General Council Youth Forum received honorariums to pursue passion projects on social justice, anti-racism, and Indigenous justice issues. As a result, they developed educational resources and social media programs for their congregations.

"These will be resources for the whole church," Crawford says excitedly.

<u>Mission & Service</u> has funded outdoor ministries like camps, and supported youth and young adults to take education trips, receive project grants, and initiate new ministries. Crawford recalls one young woman who attended the General Council 43 Youth Forum. She went on to serve as a summer intern with the Church in Mission Unit, working on social justice initiatives for youth. Now, four years later, she serves on the General Council Executive and the Moderator's Advisory Committee.

"When we provide opportunities for young people, it really does have a lasting impact on their lives and on the church," Crawford reveals.

What would Crawford want supporters like you to know about the impact of your generosity?

"I would want them to know that young people make a difference," she says, "that they are creating the next generation of leaders in the church and even beyond the church."
