Please pray with me: Rabbouni, Teacher, we have spent the past six weeks asking questions. We have turned over every rock. We have shined a light in every dusty corner. We have opened the blinds. We have wrestled with truth. We have sought after you.

So, on this Easter morning, bring wisdom to our seeking.

Move through this room until the walls echo with the sound of alleluias. Roll back the stones that might prevent us from drawing closer to you. Calm our hearts. Say our names. Awaken us to your presence in our midst.

We are here. We are listening. We are seeking after you. Alleluia.

The Easter Story: John 20:1-18 [The Message Translation] (Deb McIntosh)

Early in the morning on the first day of the week, while it was still dark, Mary Magdalene came to the tomb and saw that the stone was moved away from the entrance. She ran at once to Simon Peter and the other disciple, the one Jesus loved, gasping for breath. "They took the Master from the tomb. We don't know where they've put him."

Peter and the other disciple left immediately for the tomb. They ran, neck and neck. The other disciple got to the tomb first, outrunning Peter. Stooping to look in, he saw the pieces of linen cloth lying there, but he didn't go in. Simon Peter arrived after him, entered the tomb, observed the linen cloths lying there, and the kerchief used to cover his head not lying with the linen cloths but separate, neatly folded by itself. Then the other disciple, the one who had gotten there first, went into the tomb, took one look at the evidence, and believed. No one yet knew from the Scripture that he had to rise from the dead. The disciples then went back home.

But Mary stood outside the tomb weeping. As she wept, she knelt to look into the tomb and saw two angels sitting there, dressed in white, one at the head, the other at the foot of where Jesus' body had been laid.

They said to her, "Woman, why do you weep?"

"They took my Master," she said, "and I don't know where they put him." After she said this, she turned away and saw Jesus standing there. But she didn't recognize him.

Jesus spoke to her, "Woman, why do you weep? Who are you looking for?"

She, thinking that he was the gardener, said, "Sir, if you took him, tell me where you put him so I can care for him."

Jesus said, "Mary." Turning to face him, she said in Hebrew, "Rabboni!" meaning "Teacher!"

Jesus said, "Don't cling to me, for I have not yet ascended to the Father. Go to my brothers and tell them, 'I ascend to my Father and your Father, my God and your God."

Mary Magdalene went, telling the news to the disciples: "I saw the Master!" And she told them everything he said to her.

Nurturing Safe Space

As I've repeated through Lent, the works of the Song of Praise, Psalm 139: I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made. In our diversity is the mystery and beauty and holiness of God. May we celebrate the uniqueness, the quirks, the differences we each bring: Age, Gender, Sexual Orientation, Neurodivergence (that is, we think differently). That diversity reflects the mystery of a Creator whose wisdom is beyond anything we can imagine.

Acknowledging Traditional Territory

This area, as we know it today, is rich in the history and tradition of caring for the land and for one another of various First Nations and Métis peoples. These lands we now know as Sudbury are the traditional lands of the Wahnapitae First Nation and the Atikemeksheng Anishnawbek. As we gather today as Treaty People of the Robinson Huron Treaty made in 1850, a Treaty that our government has yet to truly honour, we are in solidarity with indigenous brothers and sisters to honour and respect the land, air, water, all Creation and its plants and animals. On this Easter Sunday, may we celebrate Christ's Resurrection by living into Right Relations, healing the wounds that Christian churches caused in this land, may we honour the spirit of this Creation and all its wonder.

Time up Front

Shout and sign "Hallelujah!" the same way you shouted and signed "Hosanna!" last Sunday. What kind of response do you receive? Maybe a hosanna or a hallelujah! Offer it again and a third time, if you want.

What does hallelujah mean? It literally means "praise God" from the Hebrew language. Ask the children and other members of the congregation: What kinds of things might make you say, "Hallelujah!"?

The birth of child or grandchild? "Hallelujah!" Passing a hard test? "Hallelujah!" The arrival of spring? "Hallelujah!" Once more, shout and sign it together several times.

This is a repeat-after-me prayer:

Dear God,...Thank you for things in life...that make us say Hallelujah. Thank you, God, for spring...and sunshine, and starry nights...and your promise...that in life...in death,...in life after death...you are always with us...Christ is Risen...Christ is Risen Indeed...Hallelujah and Amen.

When he could have clung to your glory, God who alone is holy, Jesus chose to become human at that time, so we might be filled with your grace.

When we stood against the wall wondering if anyone noticed us, he came to take us by the hand to teach us new dance steps.

With those who see and believe.

When our lives crumble around us and we lie scattered on the ground, he gathers us up, reshaping us into your beloved community.

When we were unable to break the power of evil over us, he allowed sin to toss him aside like a pebble in a shoe, until he was raised from the tomb because you refuse to give us over to death.

As we stand before the empty tomb, celebrating the great news of this day, we would have that faith which is a mystery:
Christ died, so sin could not hold on to us;
Christ was raised, so death could not hold on to him;
Christ will come, to hold us in steadfast love and hope.

Let us remember together that vision of God's reign shown to us in Jesus at table:

he shared food with followers and friends,

with saints and sinners, with crowds of thousands on the hillside.

and a few friends in an upper room.

On the night before he died, he had supper with his companions.

He took a loaf of bread, and after giving thanks, he broke it, and gave it to them, saying:

"Take, eat. Do this in remembrance of me."

Then, he took a cup, and after giving thanks, he passed it among them, saying:
"Drink this. Do this in remembrance of me."

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Through this loaf and cup, Jesus lives within us. In word and deed, Jesus lives among us.

Prayers of Community

Rainbow colours, vibrant and dancing across the path of life.

Red, orange, yellow, green, blue, and violet, filling our lives with wonder, hope, and possibility.

Jesus came, sharing the path of human life, declaring and living possibility in the midst of poverty, freedom in the midst of Roman occupation,

hope in the midst of despair,

When betrayal and death grabbed hold, burying Jesus in a cold, empty tomb, Jesus burst forth in a vibrant display of life,
