Scripture Readings (Connor Ross)

1 Corinthians 12:4-13 (Good News version)

There are different kinds of spiritual gifts, but the same Spirit gives them. There are different ways of serving, but the same Lord is served. There are different abilities to perform service, but the same God gives ability to all for their particular service. The Spirit's presence is shown in some way in each person for the good of all. The Spirit gives one person a message full of wisdom, while to another person the same Spirit gives a message full of knowledge. One and the same Spirit gives faith to one person, while to another person he gives the power to heal. The Spirit gives one person the power to work miracles; to another, the gift of speaking God's message; and to yet another, the ability to tell the difference between gifts that come from the Spirit and those that do not. Message: "Celebrating 50 Years of Blessing" Dave:

In the beginning there was a vision. The groundwork laid long before St. Andrew's Place was born. Among many stories, are those of the Rev Dr. Earl Lautenslager whose leadership nurtured a Church Extension Program – under it, St. Andrew's provided gifts and loans to assist other

United Churches as they became established, notably St. Paul's, St. Peter's, St. Luke's, and St. Stephen's on the Hill. As well, Dr. Lautenslager was a key figure in the creation of Huntington University.

1970s: "Birth"

Then, there was a vision of a unique kind of church...

Bev Chapman:

By 1971, it was clear that the building within which St. Andrew's United Church existed was no longer structurally sound. They needed a new building. By this time, the Rev. Dr. Charles Forsyth had served as minister, and his vision was of not just a Cathedral of the North, but a multi-purpose building that would be home to several floors of affordable apartments, a sanctuary, an activity hall, as well as other meeting rooms and a historic space called the Peace Chapel to remind the community where they came from.

Dave:

We give thanks for the ingenuity and hard work of so many passionate and faithful people, and for the grace of God that gave birth to St. Andrew's Place in 1973.

Bev:

In 1975 some enterprising souls at St. Andrew's conceived the notion of a fall fair which would replace stand-alone teas and bake sales. Not only would the fair serve as a significant fund-raiser for the church but also provide St. Andrew's with an opportunity to reach out to the community by hosting a weekend-long event to which everyone was welcome. And so the St. Andrew's Community Fall Fair was born, a tradition that remained in place for twenty-some years. Attractions included a bake table, a dining room, a silent auction, a rummage table, a sewing and knitting stall, a children's area, an ice cream parlour, and a book table, to name only a few. Local crafters were invited to rent tables to sell their wares. And there were always unusual offerings such as a weight guessing booth. One year our minister at the time even went around selling hair! Every year the fair had a theme such as an English country garden, a castle, a world tour, and a science fiction wonderland.

Donald Bell's Reflection (read by Dave)

The Rev. Don Bell recalls so much going on at that time: The Fall Fair had begun, here was the St. Andrew's Concert Series, here was creative worship in this versatile space. It was a very different set up for a Sanctuary – it was versatile. There was dance and drama, and on Easter Eve. Don remembers how people could come in and experience the Easter story dramatically portrayed by actors – different scenes in different spaces. During the Inco Strike in 1978, Don recalls St. Andrew's as being a space for the workers to come together to have important conversations.

Margaret Rabson's Reflection (read by Dave)

In 1983, I was contacted by the Rev. Don Bell, and asked if I might speak with him about Christian Development and Education at St. Andrew's. Since I didn't have a permanent teaching position at the time, I was pleased to meet with Don and hear what was happening at St. Andrew's. (At that time, there were a large number of children organized into a Sunday School run by faithful volunteers. "Would I be interested in a staff position, directing Christian Education and Development for children, youth and adults?" I responded positively and thus began a 21-year career as Christian Development Staff Associate.

Jesus was a teacher; he invited the children to come to him.

The Fourth Floor of St. Andrew's Place offered wonderful space and was filled on Sunday mornings with a vibrant group of eager children. The possibilities were boundless. And yes, there

were some challenges also. With the excellent support of the Christian Education Committee, we set out to prepare programming. The 'Whole People of God Curriculum' was introduced to the Sunday School and I suggested that adults might be interested in a program called 'Telling My Story, Sharing My Faith' which we ran for three different groups. Not only was this helpful for personal faith growth but encouraged leadership development for adults in many areas of the Church.

Confirmation programs were organized. Family clusters were created, encouraging families to eat, learn and play together. There were other innovative opportunities such as Advent Events and Mission Munch, as well as poignant 'Come to the Quiet' worship services.

But the world does not stand still and as it is God's gift to celebrate our past, it is God's challenge to us as people of faith to live in the new and different now. Our history can inform, guide and inspire) our present.

Our world is a very different place now. Christian Development goals are challenged. Technology is an exciting part of St. Andrew's today; there are many fewer children and leaders are fewer and older/tired.

As we enjoy wonderful times of remembering and looking back, I believe that the words spoken to the prophet Isaiah hold a truth for us today:

Behold, I am doing a new thing, Even now it is springing to light. Do you not perceive it?

I look back on my time at St. Andrew's with fondness and great memories. We faced challenges together, we learned together, we grew together. So, we go forward, in different ways and God's Spirit is our guide.

Margaret Rabson

1990s: Out of the Cold – History: Written by Jim and Joyce Dickson. Read by Donna Mese. In the fall of 1997 a small group of concerned church members, Rev. David Mundy, Brenda Furman and Judith Traulson, received permission from the St. Andrew's U.C. congregation to organize a series of dinners for needy people on a trial basis. Four dinners were held in the cafe beside the church during the winter of 1998. The trial was considered a success and church members agreed to a "Once a week event from November to mid-April, to provide a hot nutritious meal to those individuals from our community who are on the streets, in shelters or on social assistance and for those who would benefit from an opportunity to socialize in a caring, friendly and safe environment".

By the start of the first full season,1998/99, Brenda Furman had moved to London, ON and Jim Dickson volunteered to assist Judith with the administration. Four teams from St. Andrew's each served six dinners for a total of 24 meals. At the end of the season, the team captains decided that six dinners/team/year were too many and so St. Peter's and St. Stephen's were invited to join the group - they accepted immediately and started the following November.

Other teams that joined the program over the years included Church of the Epiphany and the Church of Ascension, St Lukes United, Garson United and Trinity United. Of special note was that the Holiday Inn provided the complete dinner for 5 years for the Trinity team.

Needless to say, there were many more problems in the first several years than there were solutions. Issues centred around guests arriving too early, waiting too long outside, straying into

other areas of the building and interference with resident access to the lobby and building. Eventually guests were allowed into the dining hall after 5:00 pm and served coffee and tea until dinner was served at 6:00 pm.

Initially money for food was provided by the Lola McNaughton Fund and generous contributions from local grocery stores to our teams. In 2002 Bob Bale, concert promotor was checking with Barb Ritchie about renting the building when he noticed the activity in the gym below and Barb told him it was the OOTC program. He asked if St Andrew's would be interested in his organizing concerts to fund the program. She told him to speak to Jim Dickson. The answer was yes. Over the years Bob contributed \$10,000 a year to OOTC. In 2022 the Concert Series funding was ended and \$5,000 was given to the Food Bank and to the Mission and the remainder \$11,200 was left with the OOTC to complete their services. Sadly, COVID brought an end to everything.

Guests who came to our dinners included not only the homeless but out of town college students who had run out of money from home, residents of the building, families struggling to make ends meet, lonely people who told us it was their one night out a week. All were welcome. The program was well known and highly valued throughout the Social Service community as a safe and caring place for the clients they served.

This Outreach program brought hundreds of volunteers together not only from St. Andrew's but from outside the community like Wendy Harrington who was chief cook for two teams. Over the years as the program evolved, it helped forge ties with other Sudbury churches. It was a lot of work but fun too working together to serve the needy. Any leftover food was brought to the Mission who were always happy to receive our donations.

2000 - 2009

Rev. Dr. Bill Steadman: Reflections on Years at St. Andrew's United (video)

I am happy to share some memories of my first term as Minister here at St. Andrew's United Church – 2000 to 2005. In those years I worked with Sylvia Carscadden and Marg Rabson in the ministry side of things, and I returned in 2014 to work with the Rev. Catherine Somerville. All were valued colleagues.

St. Andrew's was blessed with excellent staff, and Sylvia and Marg were and still are two of the most capable and insightful lay ministers I have ever met, so it made my transition to Sudbury relatively easy.

Two major foci come to mind in those years, though one could probably list a dozen or more events and happenings.

The first is the Out of the Cold Concerts. The Out of the Cold dinners were well established when I arrived, and they were supported by United Church members and friends from across the city,

though St. Andrew's carried the heavy burden of workers and funding for the dinners, and also had the largest number of dinner teams.

The costs continued to escalate with the growing numbers of people in need, and so Bob Bale started a series of concerts every year, sponsored by Dairy Queen, the proceeds from which went to the Out of the Cold program. It guaranteed the financial support needed for this outreach.

Bob himself was inspired to do this, he told me, because St. Andrew's sponsored a concert with Quartette, a four-person female group headed by Sylvia Tyson. Their agent at the time was a member of the choir at Rosedale United Church, from where I had come to Sudbury, and he wanted to have a concert in Sudbury. The group was excited to come -- they said during their concert that Sudbury "was the only major city in Canada they had not performed in," and such an affirmation made them a hit. The sold-out concert led to many sold-out concerts on behalf of Out of the Cold.

Another exciting activity for me were the annual Christmas plays done in the sanctuary as part of an Advent service. Many members of the congregation took part in these presentations, directed by Bert Brankley and the props were engineered by Bob Humphrey. Bob Hall always helped with creative, supportive music, and the sound and lighting crew, led by Roger Pile, made any scene believable.

Some of you may remember the themes -- a dumpster in the middle of the chancel as children found a manger scene without the baby Jesus, so they went about interviewing people to find if anyone had seen Jesus. Two miners experiencing the sense of the power of Mother Earth in the midst of their shift underground. One of my favourites was a garage that transformed into a manger scene half-way through the story. Bob Humphrey engineered the garage and the transformation into a manger scene by making the structure become barn-like – like the same manger prop that has been used as a focal point for Advent and Christmas ever since, as far as I know.

These were fun but demanding projects that showed the immense talents of the congregation. It was a delight to write the stories that then were transformative when undertaken in the sanctuary space – a space that lends itself to new ways of communicating the message of Christmas.

Congratulations on this historic milestone. I am sorry I am unable to be with you as I lead worship at Copper Cliff United Church and celebrate Baptism for two young girls and their family. I wish St. Andrew's many more years of sharing the good news with others.

Bea Arnill's Reflection: (in person) "My Time at St. Andrew's"

It was the experience of a lifetime to come back to my home church as your minister. The building had changed since my youth. The faith and caring of the congregation had not. You welcomed me and every effort was made to make me comfortable. I only needed to ask Roger. Folks dug around for furniture to fill my apartment in St. Andrew's Place, even a TV set. I felt at home.

I was delighted to see long-time friends from the past like Margaret and Ludo Winckel, Barb and Bill Thornley. I made new friends like Diane Trollope. She had a birthday party for me during my stay.

My secretary Barb Ritchie and pastoral care worker Elaine Brummer were supportive and fun to be with. I often had lunch with Barb, and I found it moving to take part in a healing liturgy with Elaine.

lan Sloane and I worked together. We were very different people, but we listened to each other and tried to understand.

The children were a happy part of the service. They took turns walking up to the front with me to light the Christ candle. When I told them stories, they sat captivated.

I volunteered for the Out of the Cold program. The event was done with such grace and warmth. Sylvia Carscadden gave a welcome and prayer at the beginning of the meal. Looking into the faces of the people we were serving was a holy experience.

I was fortunate to be asked to lead a confirmation class. There were five or six High School students that I think were all boys. Two of them were brothers and played football. They went to the Catholic High School. Their priest was interested in what they were learning and asked them questions. I had a copy of the front page of the Toronto Star from 1926, which had two long articles on the birth of the United Church. The boys borrowed it to bring to their class for discussion. And so, education spreads.

I invited Dave Le Grand to talk with the students about his faith and spiritual experience when he travelled overseas to Israel and Palestine. The boys were fascinated. At the end of confirmation, we celebrated with a BBQ at the camp of one of the parents. I felt that was an appropriate Sudbury ending.

When I left, you gave me money for my sauna and a beautiful, framed picture of the old church, the one I grew up in. The sauna has provided years of enjoyment for my family and friends. The picture hangs above my desk at camp.

My time at St. Andrew's gave me a rocket boost to continue on in active ministry for seven more years at Massey and St. Mark's. It seems that God is never done with us.

May the energy and faith that called you to newness and adventure fifty years ago bless you in the future.

Ian Sloan's Reflection: (read by Dave)

My time in ministry with you was from the 33rd year of the Place to its 36th year. I recall Scott Darling telling the story at the time of the tough negotiations a few years before with the mortgage holder – the Government of Ontario – in which the Place got out from under an impossible-to-service mortgage. That put you in a position where you could address the growing pains of owning a not-for-profit residential rental building. You could then begin to pursue your own post-construction mission and ministry.

If I have learned anything in my ministry subsequent to my ministry with you about beginning new things, it is that new things in the church have a long runway. My hunch is that in the 15 or so years since we did our work together, you are still in process as you become that new or renewed thing, that is to be St. Andrew's United Church.

One of my fondest memories of my time with you was the regional Worship Matters Conference that the Manitou Intentional Learning Community organized and led there. One moment particularly spoke to me: our keynote speaker C. Michael Hawn called the last verse of 'For the Fruit of All Creation" the most wondrous hymnody he had ever encountered:

For the harvests of the Spirit, thanks be to God.

For the good we all inherit, thanks be to God.

For the wonders that astound us, for the truths that still confound us,

Most of all, that love has found us, thanks be to God.

And we sang the whole hymn together.

I salute St. Andrew's United Church's courage and leadership in forming and nurturing the partnerships that have borne fruit as the Place. I commend you for it, and anticipate with you the harvests of the Spirit you have yet to bring in.

2010 - present

Rhodine White: (in person) "THE LARCH STREET COMMUNITY KITCHEN"

In 2015, St. Andrew's Reaching Out Team applied for a bursary being offered by St. Paul's United Church when they unfortunately had to close their doors. Our proposal, for a community kitchen, was awarded a \$6000 bursary.

The first session, held during the winter of 2016, was run by the Sudbury Public Health Unit. Jill Bennett, Anne Pile, Jeannine Zadow and I learned how to run a community kitchen. That spring the four of us lead an enthusiastic group of participants from St. Andrew's Place, St. Andrew's congregation and the neighbourhood and the Larch Street Community Kitchen was born.

Kitchens were held for three six-week sessions each year from 2016 until March 2020. We started again in the fall of 2022. Over this time the participants began to assume leadership roles in deciding the menus and leading the group. The community kitchen belongs to them, and we have become facilitators.

My husband Marcel stepped in when Jeannine was unable to attend. Other volunteers have joined us over the years. When the bursary money ran out, this St. Andrew's congregation has supplied the funding to keep the community kitchen operating. Thank you.

The participants started a voluntary collection of toonies that they donate at the end of each session to the Baby's Breathe program at Better Beginnings, Better Futures. They take on the food preparation and cooking tasks each week with enthusiasm and always help each other. They are very proud of the wonderful meals they create and make sure to bring food to members who were unable to attend.

They have helped make soup for church events and brought a big tin of their cookies to Réseau Access Network this past Christmas.

The Community Kitchen has grown from a "cooking class" to a joyful time spent with friends. The group shares information and good news. We take time to enjoy a cup of tea and a cookie and catch up on what is going on in our lives. It is a wonderful caring community that also cooks great food. Food has brought us together. Community keeps us together.

Dave continues:

This multipurpose building called St. Andrew's has hosted a wide range of events, from the Sudbury Music Festival to Bel Canto concerts, to a Nativity Walk that ran in November for several years. The Place and Church, together, have adapted to the fast-paced changes around us. With the pandemic came the challenge to connect with people in their homes. We "pivoted" and pre-recorded worship and presentations to share with people in their homes, then we live streamed.

St. Andrew's Place served as the Venue for the most recent Annual General Meeting of our United Church's Canadian Shield Regional Council, in the Fall of last year. We give thanks for the privilege of offering these spaces to welcome the community in many versatile ways.
