Time up Front

Scripture Readings (Freda Wilson) John 17:1-11 (NRSV Updated Edition)

Let us pray: God, the words you speak have power: power to create, power to disturb, power to heal. Help us to hear your word for us today. Amen.

This is a Reading from the Gospel of John. Here we listen in as Jesus prays to the Creator, whom he calls Abba, Father, but actually he addresses God more intimately, like saying, Daddy. He prays for the faithful around him, that God might take care of them, that all might be one.

Jesus prayed, "Abba, Father, the hour has come; glorify your Son so that the Son may glorify you, since you have given him authority over all people, to give eternal life to all whom you have given him.

"I have made your name known to those whom you gave me from the world. They were yours, and you gave them to me, and they have kept your word. Now they know that everything you have given me is from you, for the words that you gave to me I have given to them, and they have received them and know in truth that I came from you, and they have believed that you sent me. All mine are yours, and yours are mine, and I have been glorified in them. And now I am no longer in the world, but they are in the world, and I am coming to you. In recent years it has become obvious that we live in an increasingly divisive world, marked by violence, persecution, deprivation, inequality, and war. It can all seem overwhelming and leave us at a loss as how to respond. And yet we are called to embrace hope and seek unity. How can we answer this call? It's often easier to start small.

What are some ways in which we can promote unity within our local United Church congregations? Within Sudbury? What might be a concrete step we can take as the St. Andrew's Community of Faith?

What are some obstacles that we might face, either within ourselves or when reaching out to others?

Sit with those obstacles, and offer them prayerfully to the Creator, be open to baby steps you can take to get past them. How can you equip yourself, spiritually, for this work?

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Your Generosity Matters: Real-Time Relief Really Makes a World of Difference

We are in the midst of one of the worst hunger crises in 40 years. Millions of people around the world are going hungry every night. today I'm (Alexa) chatting with Thivan Hoang, the United Church program Coordinator for Sustainable Development and Humanitarian Response about how your generosity helps our United Church to respond to emergencies including the current hunger crisis.

Thivan, I'm really glad to be with you today. Can you tell me how Mission and Service and our Emergency Response efforts have been helping both here in Canada and around the world?

So Mission and Service is supporting Global Partners in their response to food insecurity in their communities. When a hurricane hits Cuba, or the super typhoon hits the Philippines, Partners mobilize quickly to respond in the communities with food hygiene kids psychosocial support and shelter so partners are best placed to respond to, and understand, the needs of the community best.

So, this not quite emergency response, but through Mission and Service as well and through our membership with the Canadian Foodgrains Bank and the Manitoba Council for international Cooperation, partners are doing the long-term work to address food insecurity and hunger in their communities. For example, through Conservation Agriculture and agro-ecology, the National Council of Churches of Kenya are providing conservation and agricultural training to small holder farmers, particularly women farmers, and connecting them to more experienced women farmers, that provides mentorship and support. They are also linking farmers to market so they can sell what they grow at a fair price. The impact of this is that farmers can earn income to support their children's education and other household needs, and improve their family's nutrition.

With the Zimbabwe Council of Churches, they've been able to address gender-based violence within their communities, so issues such as early child marriages are prevented. Because of food security, people are able to farm, able to earn income so that they don't have to send their girl children for early marriages because they can't afford to feed them anymore. It's a significant impact, that folks over here can help by donating through Mission and Service.

I'm amazed at how when we all pull together in one part of the world we can effect change, globally. Your gift to Mission and Service will help address both the immediate and long-term emergency response efforts. Thank you!
